## FIREMEN RECEIVE MANY CONCESSIONS

Numerous Requests Granted By the Council at Meeting Held Last Evening.

A petition of considerable length was presented and read to the borough council at the meeting held last night asking for a team to haul the Wilbur Hook and Ladder company's truck to fires. Since the company disposed of its team the firemen have complained considerably on account of the absence of ladders at fires. The truck is a heavy one and the firemen cannot be expected to pull the truck by hand. The petition provided for the purchase of a team, and after it was read it was referred to the fire committee. Following this action a motion was made that John C. Osborn, the liveryman, be employed to furnish a team to draw the truck to fires, he to receive the sum of \$5.00 for each fire. The motion was carried. The question of nozzles for the department also came before the council upon a recommendation by the fire board that the Larkin style of nozzle be purchased. Firemen present were of the opinion that three nozzles would be sufficient for the needs of the department. The matter was laid over until the meeting which will be held on Monday evening.

At a recent fire in the confectionery store in West Sayre, it was complained that several boys made considerable trouble by giving orders without authority. Chief Wood recommended to the council that several firemen should be made special officers with power to make arrests. The council named Mr. Wood as one of the special officers and also gave him authority to recommend the appointment of others.

It was also suggested that two short blasts of the fire whistle be given to notify the firemen that a fire is either extinguished, under control, or that the alarm is false. The suggestion was acted upon and hereafter two short whistles will notify firemen that their services are not needed.

Councilman Hassler moved that the chief of police be ordered to attend each fire and see that order is maintained. This motion was carried unanimously, and hereafter in addition to his other duties Chief Walsh will also be expected to be on duty in the case of a conflagration.

### "POSTER GIRLS" DID NOT APPEAR.

Show Billed For the Loomis Last Night Failed to Arrive.

Hal Merritt's "Poster Girls," which were advertised to give a high-class vaudeville performance at the Loomis last night, failed to show up at the appointed time. Manager Watrous refunded the money to those who had purchased tickets. The show was billed to appear in Halstead on Wednesday evening and Mr. Watrous telephoned to the manager of the theatre at Halstead and ascertained that the company had also failed to keep its engagement in that place. It is therefore presumed that Mr. Merritt's company has probably succumbed to bad business. The show is billed for Towanda this evening, but Manager Watrous will telephone to the manager of the house in that place that he is likely to meet with a disappointment.

### Shop Employee Injured.

Harry Gray, an employee of the new shops, was taken to the hospital this forenoon suffering from injuries received from falling from the tank of an engine. The tank had been blocked upon a pair of horses to undergo repairs. A number of boards were placed across the top and Gray was walking on these when one of them broke. He fell to the floor below a distance of twelve feet. Gray landed on his head and the boards on which he had been walking fell on top of him. There was a nail in the board which penetrated Gray's head near the ear. The surgeons at the hospital say that this may cause defense.

## MAY PURCHASE STEAM ROLLER

Street Committee Instructed to Investigate the Matter and Secure Prices, Etc.

It is among the possibilities that Sayre borough will be provided with a steam roller with which to grade and care for the streets. The matter was brought to the attention of the council last evening when Councilman Hassler suggested that the council discontinue the present system of paying sidewalk rebates and that the money thus spent be used to purchase a steam roller and apparatus for the fire department. Councilman West endorsed the suggestion and moved that the street committee be instructed to investigate the steam roller question, prices, etc., and report at the next meeting.

### LAYMEN'S CONVENTION OF THE WYOMING CONFERENCE.

It Will Be Held at Lestershire This Year and An Interesting Session is Expected.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Laymen's Association of Wyoming Conference, held in the office of Reed B. Freeman, Binghamton on Monday the program for the coming convention of the association to be held in Lestershire on Friday, April 5, was arranged.

The meeting was attended by Messrs. Freeman of Binghamton, Thompson of Greene, Rowe of Onocota, Powell of Dunmore, vice presidents, and Sanford of Waverly, field secretary.

According to the by-laws adopted at the last convention, all lay-members of the Methodist-Episcopal church, over twenty-one years of age, are entitled to all the privileges of the association at its annual meeting but that churches may be sure of representation, they are urged to send delegates, one for each hundred members or major fraction thereof, and the secretary was instructed to inform the churches.

The association is preparing for a rousing meeting this year, distinguished speakers being expected.

## SEWER CONTRACT NOT YET AWARDED

Bids Tabulated and Received But Action Was Deferred Until Next Monday Evening.

At a regular adjourned meeting of the council held last evening the awarding of the contract to construct a trunk line sewer in Sayre borough was deferred until next Monday evening at eight o'clock, to which time the council adjourned. The bids as tabulated by the borough engineer were received and placed on file. The result of the bidding is as follows: Busch & Stewart, \$20,912.14; J. J. Higgins, \$19,312.80; Bolton G. Coon, \$21,569.80; John L. Shea & Co., \$19,669.00; H. P. Farling, \$22,234.56; John J. Tine & Co., \$24,669.40; More & Smith, \$24,150.00; Fritz & Partridge, \$22,160.20.

From the above figures it will be seen that J. J. Higgins is the lowest bidder, and he is followed closely by John L. Shea & Co. of this place.

The borough engineer's estimate was \$19,658.40.

It was expected that the contract would be awarded last night but after the tabulated report of the borough engineer had been received a motion was made to adjourn until next Monday evening at eight o'clock when it is probable that the matter will be disposed of.

### CONDITIONS ALONG THE SUSQUEHANNA.

Stream Has Been Very Low But Warm Weather is Likely to Bring On Big Flood.

People living along the Susquehanna are now becoming interested in the flood question. The indications are that the annual spring breakup is near at hand, the past few days having been so mild that the snow and ice have melted rapidly. The rains of the past few days have also added materially to the amount of water running into the river. The river is said to be unusually low and the ice is several inches in thickness. From now on, however, it is expected that the rise will be rapid, and it is feared that a big flood will result.

There is a large amount of snow on the hill sides along the river, and continued warm weather will cause this to rush down in a hurry, in which event trouble of a dire nature is feared.

### ADDITIONAL WARDS ARE A NECESSITY.

Legislature Asked to Make an Appropriation Sufficient to Build More Wards.

James B. Maney and Hon. L. T. Hoyt returned from Harrisburg this morning where they together with Dr. Ott and M. H. Sawtelle of Sayre have been as a committee to urge the legislature to make the appropriation for the Packer hospital at this session large enough to cover not only its necessary working expenses but to provide for the construction of additional wards that are found to be of urgent necessity. Dr. Stevens joined them and they asked for \$55,000. This would provide the needed sum of \$25,000 for the running expenses and \$30,000 for the additional wards. The gentlemen of the committee were received with a great deal of respect and they feel sure that their request will be granted.
