REBECCA M. WALKER.

Athens—Rebecca M. Walker, widow of the late Zephon F. Walker, died at the old homestead in Athens township, Saturday morning at three o'clock of pneumonia. Rebecca M. Walker, second child of Amos and Cynthia Franklin was born at Seneca, Lenawee Co., Michigan, August 9th, 1837. Her father was a son of Billy Franklin and grandson of the late Col. John Franklin. At the age of 17 he came to live with his grandfather in Athens and remained there until after the death of the Col. in 1831. In May, 1835 he married Cynthia McKinney and moved to Michigan, then a territory and wilderness, purchased a farm there and remained until his death in 1845. It was at this point that the subject of the sketch was born. In 1853 she made a visit to her mother's relatives in Bradford county and there taught school two terms in Athens township. In April 1855 she returned to her mother's home in Seneca, Michigan, and was married there on the 9th day of the ensuing August to Zephon F. Walker. After the marriage she came back to Athens and began housekeeping on the old Col. John Franklin homestead, where she spent the following fifty-two years of her life.

Mrs. Walker raised a large family namely: Frank Z. Walker, Nathan F. Walker, Fred I. Walker, Clara A. Bonfoey, Ada M. Walker and Helena L. Walker, all of whom survive her except Frank Z. who died in February, 1905.

She led an active life the business calling of her husband, Mr. Zephon F. Walker (a civil engineer), calling him so much from home, making her home duties very arduous as the entire care of the family and household all devolved upon her. She was a thorough Christian woman and inculcated its principles in her family at all times. Her long continued residence at the old homestead brought her in touch with many people, and the friends that she leaves behind her are many. Mrs. Walker was beloved by all who knew her and the community had suffered a loss it can ill afford.

The last rites will be held at her late home, Monday afternoon at two o'clock, and the interment will be at Tioga Point cemetery.

Orson Holcomb.

H. Stimson and was foreman of his tannery in Luzerne county, coming to Athens with Mr. Stimson 20 years ago and he has resided with him ever since. His funeral will be private from the Stimson house, tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 o'clock and his remains will be taken on the 10:28 Erie train to Albany, N. Y., for interment.

ORDINANCE NO. 24.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Sayre Electric Company, a corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, having its principal office in Sayre Borough, its successors or assigns, the privilege of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables, and conductors of an electric lighting, heating and power system, over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, and public grounds within the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, is hereby granted the rights and privileges of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables, and conductors over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds within the corporate limits of said Borough, as they now are or shall be hereafter extended, for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power to said Borough and its inhabitants for illuminating, heating and mechanical purposes, by means of electrical current, and to operate, use, maintain repair and extend the same over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds in said Borough and for the purpose aforesaid to make all necessary excavations for poles, etc., in any and all of said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds at any and all times, under the following terms and conditions.

Section 2. All poles shall be of good sound cedar or chestnut, reasonably straight and properly shaped, and shall be set inside the curb line at such points as shall be designated by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 3. All wires used shall be of first class quality, properly insulated, same to be properly stayed and maintained, and where strung on poles said poles shall be of sufficient height and the said wires shall be strung at such height above the ground as directed by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 4. All poles, wires, cables, appliances, structures and erections of every kind used or employed in, upon or over any of the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds within said Borough for the purpose of the distribution of electricity under this ordinance, shall at all times be kept and maintained in good and proper order and repair and in a safe, suitable and proper condition.

Section 5. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall at all times hereafter save and keep harmless the Borough of South Waverly from any and all suits, actions, damages, costs, counsel fees and expenses of every nature and kind by reason of the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 6. The said Borough shall have during the term of this franchise, without charge therefor, the right to use the poles of the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, for police and fire alarm wires, without hindrance or molestation, using for the said purpose the uppermost portion of the poles.

Section 7. Should the said Company, its successors or assigns, at any time decide to place its wires, cables or appliances or any other part thereof on underground, it shall have the right to construct the necessary underground subway or conduits in, under, on or across the streets, alleys, lanes, avenues and public places within the said Borough for said purpose. Said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Borough Council and the streets, lanes, avenues, and public grounds of said Borough shall be placed in as good condition after the work has been done as they were before, and in case the said Company, its successors or assigns, fail to clean up the said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds or make necessary repairs, in that case the Borough shall have the right to do said work, and collect the cost thereof, with all costs, expenses and counsel fees, from the said Company, its successors or assigns.

Section 8. This franchise shall terminate at the expiration of thirty-five years from the date of its granting.

Section 9. The said Company, or some one duly authorized in its behalf, shall within thirty days from this date file a written acceptance of this franchise with the clerk of the Borough Council and shall pay the expense of drafting and advertising this Ordinance.

Section 10. A failure on the part of the said Company, its successors or assigns, to fully comply with all the terms and conditions of this franchise shall render the same, and all rights thereunder, void and the same shall thereby be forfeited.

Section 11. The franchise hereby granted shall not be considered as depriving the Borough of South Waverly from granting other franchises for furnishing Electric light, heating and power, to other Companies.

Section 12. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of South Waverly Borough during the month of January, 1907, the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1908, the sum of Sixty (\$60.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1909, the sum of Seventy (\$70.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1910, the sum of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1911, the sum of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1912, the sum of Ninety (\$90.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1913, the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; and a like sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars during the month of January of each and every year thereafter, during the term of this franchise, as a franchise tax. The said sum to be in lieu of all other local taxes.

Section 13. The Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall, during the term of this franchise, furnish Electric light free of charge to the Borough of South Waverly for lighting the Borough lockup and Town Hall both inside and outside.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted by the South Waverly Council at a meeting held on the Fourth day of March, 1907.
