GRAPPY IN ROSTRUMS

Contractor Van Harsburg notified Made \$200,000 on Purchasing.

HARRISBURG, Pa., March 20.—The capitol investigating committee resumed its inquiry here into the cost of the new state capitol and took much additional testimony. By witnesses it was shown that John H. Sanderson & Co. of Philadelphia, contractors for furnishing the capitol, was paid by the state \$20,748.40 for the rostrums in the senate and house music rooms.

Later the subcontractor for this work testified that he was paid \$2,000 by Sanderson for these rostrums.

The testimony of the same subcontractor showed that Sanderson's profit on the finished woodwork in fourteen other rooms in the building amounted to \$120,045.60.

Murray Gibson, who was an unsuccessful bidder against Sanderson for the contract for decorating and painting the building, testified that there was a difference of \$1,994, a foot in favor of the state in his bid and that of Sanderson and that if the state had accepted his bid the state would have saved more than \$600,000 on this item alone, and he, Gibson, would have made a nice profit.

None of the witnesses who were asked about the "per foot" and "per pound" rule under which Sanderson was paid for the capitol furnishings ever heard of this rule until it was employed in the furnishing of the new capitol.

The testimony showed that there were also large profits in the contract for the parquet flooring and the thermostats in the building.

PITTSBURGH FLOODS

Allegheny People Moving to Higher Ground—Electric Storm's Mite City.
PITTSBURGH, March 20.—The Monongahela, Allegheny, Ohio, Youghiogheny and Kiskiminetas rivers are rising rapidly on account of heavy rains throughout the western part of Pennsylvania. Creeks and other small streams in this vicinity are already swollen beyond their banks. Forecaster Penny-Witt of the United States weather bureau predicts a twenty-five foot stage this afternoon. If this is realized it will inundate the lowlands of Allegheny county.

Everybody located in the flood zone are taking precautions to protect their property. People are moving out of the houses located in the lower part of Allegheny. Business houses in the downtown district of Pittsburgh and Allegheny are moving their goods to higher floors after a majority of them had just finished moving the goods into basements following the recent great flood.

A storm, accompanied by lightning and wind, caused an interruption to telephone and telegraph communication throughout western Pennsylvania and West Virginia. For hours there was absolutely no communication whatever with western Pennsylvania points.

In many suburbs the water is pouring rapidly into the houses. The rise came so unexpectedly that many of the people in outlying districts were unprepared and have sustained considerable damage.

ORDINANCE NO. 24.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Sayre Electric Company, a corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, having its principal office in Sayre Borough, its successors or assigns, the privilege of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables, and conductors of an electric lighting, heating and power system, over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, and public grounds within the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, that it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, is hereby granted the rights and privileges of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables and conductors over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds within the corporate limits of said Borough, as they now are or shall be hereafter extended, for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power to said Borough and its inhabitants for illuminating, heating and mechanical purposes, by means of electric currents, and to operate, use, maintain repair and extend the same over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds in said Borough and for the purpose aforesaid to make all necessary excavations for poles, etc., in any and all of said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds at any and all times, under the following terms and conditions.

Section 2. All poles shall be of good sound cedar or chestnut, reasonably straight and properly shaped, and shall be set inside the curb line at such points as shall be designated by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 3. All wires used shall be of first class quality, properly insulated, same to be properly stayed and maintained, and where strung on poles said poles shall be of sufficient height and the said wires shall be strung at such height above the ground as directed by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 4. All poles, wires, cables, appliances, structures and erections of every kind used or employed in, upon or over any of the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds within said Borough for the purpose of the distribution of electricity under this ordinance, shall at all times be kept and maintained in good and proper order and repair and in a safe, suitable and proper condition.

Section 5. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall at all times hereafter save and keep harmless the Borough of South Waverly from any and all suits, actions, damages, costs, counsel fees and expenses of every nature and kind by reason of the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 6. The said Borough shall have during the term of this franchise, without charge therefor, the right to use the poles of the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, for police and fire alarm wires, without hindrance or molestation, using for the said purpose the uppermost portion of the poles.

Section 7. Should the said Company, its successors or assigns, at any time decide to place its wires, cables or appliances in that case the Borough shall have the right to have the right to construct the necessary underground subway or conduits in, under, on or across the streets, alleys, lanes, avenues and public places within the said Borough for the purpose of the said franchise, under the direction and supervision of the Borough Council and the streets, lanes, alleys, avenues and public grounds of said Borough shall be placed in as good condition after the work has been done as they were before, and in case the said Company, its successors or assigns, fail to clean up the said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds or make necessary repairs, in that case the Borough shall have the right to do said work, and collect the cost thereof, with all costs, expenses and counsel fees, from the said Company, its successors or assigns.

Section 8. This Franchise shall terminate at the expiration of thirty-five years from the date of its granting.

Section 9. The said Company, or some one duly authorized in its behalf, shall within thirty days from this date file a written acceptance of this franchise with the clerk of the Borough Council and shall pay the expense of drafting and advertising this Ordinance.

Section 10. A failure on the part of the said Company, its successors or assigns, to fully comply with all the terms and conditions of this franchise shall render the same, and all rights thereunder, void and of no effect, and shall thereby be forfeited.

Section 11. The franchise hereby granted shall not be considered as depriving the Borough of South Waverly from granting other franchises for furnishing Electric light, heating and power, to other Companies.

Section 12. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of the Borough of South Waverly during the month of January, 1908, the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1909, the sum of Sixty (\$60.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1910, the sum of Seventy (\$70.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1911, the sum of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1912, the sum of Ninety (\$90.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1913, the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; and a like sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars during the month of January of each and every year thereafter, during the term of this franchise, as a franchise tax. The said sum to be in lieu of all other local taxes.

Section 13. The Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall, during the term of this franchise, furnish Electric light free of charge to the Borough of South Waverly for lighting the Borough lockup and Town Hall both inside and outside.

Section 14. This Ordinance shall be effective after having been properly passed, signed, advertised, according to law, and accepted by the said Company.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted by the South Waverly Council at a meeting held on the Fourth day of March, 1907.


