KNOCKED MAN DOWN PAID FIVE DOLLARS

Men Became Involved in a Dispute Over a Deal, and One of Them Employed Strenuous Measures.

Waverly—It cost Frank Parsons the sum of five dollars one day this week for the privilege of hitting a man and knocking him down. Parsons is a large and powerful man who conducts a blacksmith shop at North Waverly. He weighs some where in the neighborhood of 250 pounds, and has a pugnacious temper that is commensurate with his size. A man named Millheim, who resides some where in the neighborhood with Parsons purchased a wagon tongue from him with the understanding that it would fit his Millheim's wagon. The purchaser tried to fit it to the wagon without success, so he returned it to Parsons and asked for the money that he had given in payment. Parsons refused, and they became involved in a dispute during which Parsons struck Millheim a powerful blow, knocking him down. Parsons was arrested. He claimed that he had merely pushed his adversary and had not struck him with his fist. The marks on Millheim, however, convinced the justice that something more than a gentle push had been employed to produce them, and he imposed a fine of five dollars which was paid.

SUGGESTED CHANGE IN FORM OF BALLOT

Advocate the Adoption of the Massachusetts Ballot in This State—Does Away With the Party Column.

Waverly—On Tuesday last the committee having the matter in charge at Albany gave a hearing relative to some proposed changes in the form of ballot used in this state. It is suggested that the form known as the Massachusetts ballot be adopted. It differs from the ballot in use here, in not having any emblem on the ticket, and in abolishing the party column. The column is headed with the name of the office, and the names of the candidates for the office are arranged in alphabetical order under this heading, and the name of the party to which the candidate belongs is indicated after his name. To vote it is necessary to mark the name of each candidate for which the voter wishes to cast his ballot.
