FIGHTING IN HONDURAS

Salvador Commander Claims a Victory in Mountain Fight.

RAN SALVADOR, Republic of Salvador, March 21.—The following report by General Jose Dolores Frost, Commander of the Salvadoran forces that is engaged with Honduras fighting Nicaragua, is made public:

"We attacked the enemy with a large force in the fortified hills known as the Portillos de Namasque, and our artillery, taking ground in front and on the sides of the hills, shelled the position."

"The battle began at 5 o'clock in the morning with a heavy artillery fire. General Avilar and Licona operated on the right wing, while General Chavarria conducted the strategic movements on the left. The infantry division of our army was in the center, and our columns, with unrivaled gallantry, carried the front and flanking positions of the enemy by assault. We dislodged the enemy from all their positions, although a desperate resistance was made."

"The enemy, estimated at 5,000 well armed men, have taken up a new position in the hills."

"The Honduran forces had regrettable losses in commanding and other officers."

"The enemy's losses in killed and wounded were large."

Senor Sanchez has left Nicaragua for Ecuador on the steamer Tucapel. He is confidential agent of President Zelaya and goes to Ecuador to endeavor to obtain the support of President Alfar of that country for Nicaragua in her fight against Honduras.

THE REGULAR ANSWER.

Secretary Leoh Refers All Business to Election Speech of 1904.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—If you write a letter to the president saying you have looked over the situation in your neighborhood and are convinced that he will have to accept another nomination for the presidency, you will in due course of time get this reply:

With respect to your letter, my instant has been received, and the president thanks you for writing. While he appreciates your kindly sentiment, he has nothing to add to his statement issued on the night of his election, 1904. Very truly yours,

Every few days some newspaper prints this letter with the "startling" announcement that it has just been received by a prominent citizen who wrote to the president saying that everything therabouts "looked like Roosevelt for 1908." As a matter of fact, hundreds of letters come to the White House every week from friends of the president who say they hope he will reconsider his determination not to stand for another nomination. All these letters are turned over to a clerk, who has before him the form of answer used above, and identical replies are sent to the well wishers. The form has been in use for months, and the country has been literally flooded with the stereotyped answer.

The form of answer was originally prepared by the president, and he continues to stand pat.

ORDINANCE NO. 24.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Sayre Electric Company, a corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, having its principal office in Sayre Borough, its successors or assigns, the privilege of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables and conductors of an Electric lighting, heating and power system, over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, and public grounds within the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, is hereby granted the rights and privileges of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables and conductors over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds within the corporate limits of said Borough, as they now are or shall be hereafter extended, for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power to said Borough and its inhabitants for illuminating, heating and mechanical purposes, and by means of electrical currents, and to operate, use, maintain repair and extend the same over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds in said Borough, and for the purpose aforesaid to make all necessary excavations for poles, etc., in any and all of said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds at any and all times, under the following terms and conditions.

Section 2. All poles shall be of good sound cedar or chestnut, reasonably straight and properly shaped, and shall be set in the curb line at such points as shall be designated by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 3. All wires used shall be of first class quality, properly insulated, set, same to be properly stayed and maintained, and where strung on poles said poles shall be of sufficient height and the said wires shall be strung at such height above the ground as directed by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 4. All poles, wires, cables, appliances, structures and erections of every kind used or employed in, upon or over any of the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds within said Borough for the purpose of the distribution of electricity under this ordinance, shall at all times be kept and maintained in good and proper order and repair, and in a safe, suitable and proper condition.

Section 5. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall at all times hereafter serve and keep barrier-free the Borough of South Waverly from any and all suits, actions, damages, costs, counsel fees and expenses of every nature and kind by reason of the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 6. The said Borough shall be placed in the term of this franchise, without charge therefor, the right to use the poles of the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, for police and fire alarm wires, without hindrance or molestation, using for the said purpose the uppermost portion of the poles.

Section 7. Should the said Company, its successors or assigns, at any time decide to place its wires, cables or appliances or any other part thereof underground, it shall have the right to construct the necessary underground subway or conduits in, under, on or across the streets, lanes, alleys, avenues and public places within the said Borough for said purpose. Said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Borough Council and the streets, lanes, alleys, avenues and public grounds of said Borough shall be placed in as good condition after the work has been done as they were before, and in case the said Company, its successors or assigns, fail to clean up the said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds or make necessary repairs, in that case the Borough shall have the right to do said work, and collect the cost thereof, with all costs, expenses and counsel fees, from the said Company, its successors or assigns.

Section 8. This Franchise shall terminate at the expiration of thirty-five years from the date of its granting.

Section 9. The said Company, or some one duly authorized in its behalf, shall within thirty days from this date file a written acceptance of this franchise with the clerk of the Borough Council and shall pay the expense of drafting and advertising this Ordinance.

Section 10. A failure on the part of the said Company, its successors or assigns, to fully comply with all the terms and conditions of this franchise shall render the same null and void and the same shall thereby be forfeited.

Section 11. The franchise hereby granted shall not be considered as depriving the Borough of South Waverly from granting other franchises for furnishing Electric light, heating and power, to other Companies.

Section 12. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of South Waverly Borough during the month of January, 1908, the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1909, the sum of Sixty (\$60.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1910, the sum of Seventy (\$70) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1911, the sum of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1912, the sum of Ninety (\$90.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1913, the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; and a like sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars during the month of January of each and every year thereafter, during the term of this franchise, as a franchise tax. The said sum to be in lieu of all other local taxes.

Section 13. The Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall, during the term of this franchise, furnish Electric light free of charge to the Borough of South Waverly for lighting the Borough lockup and Town Hall both inside and outside.

Section 14. This Ordinance shall be effective after having been properly passed, signed, advertised, according to law, and accepted by the said Company.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted at a meeting held on the Fourth day of March, 1907.
