**ATHENS BRIEFS**  
**ALLEGED MURDERER**  
**ARRESTED YESTERDAY**

Stiles Compton Is Wanted By Michigan Authorities for Crime Committed Twelve Years Ago.

On November 14, 1912, an old gentleman, named William Lampman, was murdered at his home in Eagle, a small place about five miles from Grand Ledge, Mich. At that time Stiles Compton was carrying on a blacksmith shop in the place and John Butcher was a kind of congenial companion of his. Soon after the murder Compton left town and has been living in Bradford county, at Lix, ever since. John Butcher was arrested and convicted, and is now serving a life sentence for the murder. A little over a year ago, a sister of John Butcher, a Mrs. O'Brien, came to Athens and procured an affidavit from Compton to be used for the purpose of getting a pardon for her brother. Nothing ever came of this proceeding and John Butcher still languishes in the jail of Eaton county for the crime. There has been suspicion all along that Stiles Compton was in some way implicated in this murder, and finally steps have been taken to secure arrest and trial for the crime. Accordingly a warrant was sworn out by Thomas J. Toaz, charging him with the crime, and the sheriff, Eaton county, together with Prosecuting Attorney Elmer N. Peters, came to Athens last night and a warrant for the arrest of Compton was issued by H. F. Johnson, Esq., and placed in the hands of Detective McGovern, who arrested him and brought him to Athens this morning, where he was committed to the lock-up until he had a hearing before Justice Johnson at 10 o'clock. He was held and taken to Towanda jail on the 5 o'clock train where he will be kept until a requisition can be obtained when he will be taken to Eaton County, Michigan for trial. District Attorney Peters will go to Harrisburg tonight for the requisition.

**W. V. Halsey, Charged With Swindling of \$75,000, Arrested in Philadelphia.**  
**SAN FRANCISCO, March 22**—Now that the story of municipal graft and corruption here has been revealed, in part at least, by the seventy-five indictments returned against Abe Ruef and others it is announced that the supreme effort of the prosecutors will be to convict the bribe givers.

These men are regarded as the real criminals, and it is said the small fry may be spared if they give to the state all the information they possess in the various cases.

While neither Assistant District Attorney Heney nor Detective Burns was admitted that the supervisors were propped up by the bribes, it is virtually certain that they will not be proceeded against.

Burns refused to discuss a report that certain "boss" Ruef had been promised partial immunity if he would confess.

less and enable the prosecution to trace the bribes said to have been handed by him back to the officials of the public service corporation in such a manner as to secure their conviction. Burns, however, vehemently denied that an agreement had been entered into with Mayor Schmitz.

The indictments returned followed "skilful work by Heney and Burns the last week or ten days."

The entering wedge was driven when Supervisors Longman and Boxton are said to have been trapped by them in the act of taking a small bribe. Their confessions were followed by that of Supervisor Sanderson.

With the confession of these three, supplemented by a mass of information obtained from other sources, the rest of the supervisors, except J. J. Furey, were summoned before the grand jury Monday.

When confronted with the confessions of their colleagues, it is said, they literally fell over each other to tell all they knew and thereby secure immunity from prosecution. They made most sensational disclosures of bribery and corruption.

Of the seventy-five new indictments sixty-five are against Abraham Ruef, for years political boss of San Francisco, charging him with bribing the board of supervisors to grant franchises to the United Railroads, the Home Telephone company, the San Francisco Gas and Electric company and the so-called "Private Right Trust."

Ten are against T. V. Halsey, formerly general agent of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company, who is charged with having bribed the supervisors not to grant a franchise to a rival company.

Among witnesses called were several officials of the Pacific States Telephone company, which, it is alleged, tendered a bribe to the supervisors through T. V. Halsey, who was indicted and is now under arrest in Manila.

The grand jury made a determined effort to trace the \$75,000 alleged to have been paid by Halsey to ten supervisors to prevent the granting of a franchise to the Home Telephone company.

**Had Loot in Dinner Pails.**  
**FALL RIVER, Mass., March 22**—A number of the employees of the American Printing company were searched by detectives as they left the works last night, and thirteen of them were arrested charged with the larceny of cloth. The detectives are said to have found strips of cloth taken from the print works wrapped about the bodies of some of the men and stuffed into the dinner pails of others.

**Ballston Spa's Centennial.**  
**BALLSTON, N. Y., March 22**—Ballston Spa celebrated its centennial. The board of trustees held a meeting at the home of Trustee William S. Waterbury and in the same room where the first burff was organized a hundred years ago. During the summer an old home week will be held to celebrate the anniversary.

**General Will Die Suddenly.**  
**PHILADELPHIA, March 22**—Brigadier General Theodore J. Wint, U. S. A., commanding the department of Missouri, with headquarters at Omaha, died suddenly of heart disease at a hotel here. He came to Philadelphia some weeks ago to undergo medical treatment. He was sixty-two years old.

**Will Have No Channel Tunnel.**  
**LONDON, March 22**—The revived project of tunneling the English channel received its deathblow, at least for a long time to come, by the announcement of the government's well-considered decision against the enterprise in parliament.

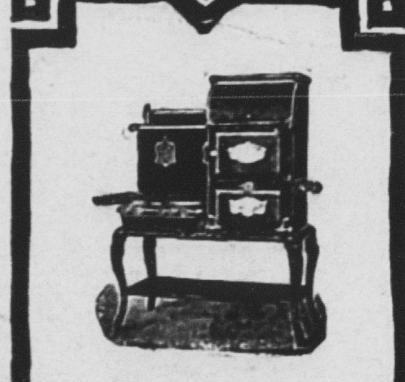
