ORIGINAL LESSONS IN HIGH FINANCE

The Blostein Firm Give An Exhibition of What May Be Done if One is Only Sufficiently Sagacious.

Waverly—There were several lessons in "high," "frenzied," or some other kind of finance brought out Friday in the hearing of Charles and Joseph Blostein, who were held by Justice Hoagland for grand larceny. One matter was a method of doing a banking business, without having any funds in a bank. The various members of the family are located in different places, including Waverly, Elmira and Ithaca. Each member in each of the places has a package of checks endorsed in blank by each of the others. Now, as the scribe understood from the evidence, a member in Elmira would fill out one of the blank checks for a given amount drawn on a Waverly bank, and it would take about three days for the check to get to New York and back to the Waverly bank. In the meantime, the Waverly branch would have been notified, and they would fill out a check endorsed by the Elmira branch and deposit it before the first check came back, and this latter check would be guarded in the same way so that when one showed up there was always an amount to the credit of the drawer to cover it. At length however, this played out, and as a result the checks went to protest, and then the trouble developed.

The story of the present difficulty is as follows: A man named Levine, who has been doing business with the defendants had a check drawn on the Citizens Bank of Waverly in his favor that was endorsed by them. He went to the complainant W. M. Spiegel, and told him that the bank in Elmira did not know the Blostein's and asked him to give him his check in return for the Blostein check. Spiegel consented, and drew his check in favor of Levine marking it cash, and took the Blostein check. This check came to the Citizen's bank at Waverly, and there was no funds. It seems that the Blosteins were on the watch, and Charles Blostein went to Spiegel and asked him to withdraw the check for if it was protested it would hurt the credit of the firm. Spiegel wanted to know how he would be secured, and Charles stated that they had a quantity of junk that they would turn over to him. Spiegel consented, and a list of the junk was made out and the price agreed upon, and Spiegel's son came to Waverly, looked it over and verified the statement. Spiegel also paid them \$15 to load the stuff on a car.

YEARLY MEETING THIS EVENING

Village Trustees Will Convene This Evening For The First Time Since Election.

Waverly—The Village Board of Trustees will hold their first meeting since election this evening at 7 o'clock. President Lawrence, and Trustees Brown, Brougham and Bennett were sworn in at noon today, and this evening the regular organization will be perfected, and the committees appointed. The following officers are also to be appointed at this time: Village clerk, village attorney, chief of police, two night watchmen, members of the board of health, cemetery sexton, and care taker of the town clock.

FREE PRESS PLANT NOW BEING MOVED.

Will Occupy New Quarters in the Manoca Temple Building.

Waverly—The plant of the Waverly Free Press is now being moved from the old quarters that it has occupied for many years into the more commodious quarters in Manoca Temple. The new place has been fitted up in excellent style, and occupies the greater part of the first floor of the building.

The office is in the room that was formerly the entrance to the Toga hotel. It has a complete system of filing cases, and a large number of receptacles for all the finer material that is used in the printing business. The press room is in the basement on the north side of the building, and is equipped with a large number of conveniences. An elevator for the purpose of lowering stock, and the handling of forms has been installed, and adequate provision has been made for light and ventilation. The room over the press room will be used as a work room. The paper will be continued as a weekly as heretofore.

Replevin Action Settled.

Waverly—The replevin action recently brought in Ithaca by W. M. Spiegel for the recovery of a car load of junk, which the plaintiff claims to have purchased from the Blostein brothers in Waverly, and which they subsequently gave over to the citizen's bank of Waverly has been settled by the bank paying Mr. Spiegel the amount that he paid for the junk. This action grew out of the same acts that terminated in the arrest of the Blostein brothers for grand larceny, and for which they were held to the grand jury on Friday last by Justice Hoagland.
