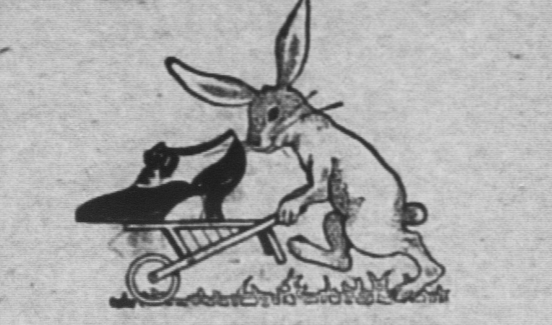

She had been ill with grip and reduced in strength as she has taken nothing to eat and is gradually growing weaker all of the time. Her mother was in to see her yesterday afternoon and tried to persuade her to return home but she says she had rather stay in the lock up under the protection of the police. The commission in lunacy appointed over her consists of Dr. Badger, H. F. Johnson and Lee Stacy. While they desire to do what is best there seems a delay for some reason or other and the girl's condition certainly demands prompt attention. The committee have reported the conditions to the county commissioners and they expect that they will take the girl in charge some time today.

ROUMANIAN REVOLT.
Peasant Riots Make Trouble on King Charles Estate.
VIENNA, March 28.—Dispatches from Czernowitz, on the Moldavian frontier, say that conditions in certain parts of Roumania are still most serious. Grave disorders are reported to have broken out on the estates of King Charles at Polana, and troops have been sent to the royal domains.

Large numbers of peasant rioters have been killed in conflicts near Braila and Papiulescha, and it appears that many rioters are trying to enter the town of Galatz were repulsed by soldiers near the village of Losaveni with a loss of twenty killed. The peasants then turned their attention on Iralia. Sanguinary fighting is reported also at Viasta, near Stareskie, and at Craiova.

The number of persons killed daily is growing enormously. Three hundred persons have been killed in an encounter between peasants and the military at Stareskie, and there have been two bloody battles at Mastrestier, in one of which Lieutenant Jonelescu lost his life. The peasants tore the body of the lieutenant to pieces and danced upon the bloody remnants to wild music.

Similar atrocities are reported from the districts of Dimbrovitz and Dolj, where numerous villages and farms have been burned down.
The situation in Galatz is also most threatening.

Western Railroad Men May Strike.
CHICAGO, March 28.—Negotiations between the general managers of the western railroads and representatives of the conductors and the trainmen, who have presented demands for shorter hours and increased pay, have been declared off. The conference is not entirely over, and it is possible that it may be resumed. The general managers declined to say what had transpired and refused to make a statement. Grand Chief Morrissey of the trainmen said after the adjournment that a meeting of the men would be held and their future course determined.

Suez Taxes of Doubt.
NEW YORK, March 28.—The assessment of the estate of Russell Sage, which was tentatively placed at \$50,000,000, has been cut down to \$2,258,000. Much of the estate has been turned into bonds that are outside the jurisdiction of the department of taxes and assessments, and this caused the big drop in the assessment.

Wellman to Start North July 4.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 28.—Major H. B. Hersey, inspector of the post office, will sail for Paris on April 3 to assist in the arrangements for the Wellman aerial polar expedition to the north pole. The party will leave Spitzbergen in their flight to the north pole about July 4.
