# THE VALLEY RECORD WILL DISCONTINUE

Subscription List Has Been Bought By The Daily Times While J. H. Murrelle, Publisher of The Record Purchases Job Department of The Daily Times.

Today's issue of The Valley Record marks the end of its publication by the founder and owner, J. H. Murrelle. Papers were signed today by which C. L. Francisco, proprietor of The Sayre Daily Times, purchases the subscription lists and good will of The Record, and will merge the lists of the two dailies, Mr. Murrelle retiring from the publication. Another agreement was concluded at the same time by which Mr. Murrelle purchases the good will of the job and book printing departments of The Daily Times, and henceforth The Times discontinues job and book printing.

After full consideration of the matter it was decided by both parties that their interests would be best subserved by this arrangement and that it would be to the advantage of their patrons as well that such an arrangement should be made. The job printing and newspaper business are so incompatible that it is almost impossible to give satisfaction in either branch of the business where they are both handled by the same plant.

The Times, as it now stands, augmented by the circulation of The Record, has total of considerably over 3,000 subscribers in the three valley towns, thus making it the most widely read paper anywhere in this section of the country.

# DETECTIVE KELLEY ARRESTED IN SAYRE

Bent No. 7 from Wilkes-Barre to Sayre, But Was Released on Charge of Illegal Train Riding.

"Star Kelley," one of the best known thief takers in the country and an efficient member of the Pinkerton detective agency, found himself in a peck of trouble yesterday afternoon when he reached Sayre, and for a few hours he was a guest at the borough jail.

Kelley arrived in Sayre yesterday afternoon on Lehigh passenger train No. 7. Instead of riding in one of the coaches and paying his fare he occupied a place on the platform between the baggage coach and the engine. When the train pulled into the local station Kelley jumped off the train and landed into the arms of Special Officer D. J. Kendig. The latter took Kelley to the lockup on a charge of illegal train riding. Kelley protested that he was a detective and that he had been in Pittston recently looking for a couple of desperadoes who were implicated in the Shortsville bank robbery which occurred a few weeks ago. He stated that he had chased the two suspects to Wilkes-Barre and in that city learned that the men had taken a Lehigh train west. In Wilkes-Barre Kelley ran out of funds and it was necessary for him to beat his way through the country on freight trains or else loose track of his men. He attempted to board a westbound passenger train at Wilkes-Barre, but was caught in the act by Mart Garrahan, the well known Lehigh Valley special officer. Garrahan grabbed Kelley just as the latter was about to jump on board the train. Kelley tore loose from the officer and made a second attempt, when the officer let drive his right which caught Kelley on the point of the jaw. To substantiate this story Kelley pointed to a bruise on his jaw which he claims was the result of the blow delivered by Garrahan. Kelley, however, succeeded in getting out of Wilkes-Barre on train No. 7 yesterday, but when he landed in Sayre he again found himself in limbo.

After Kelley had told his story to Officer Kendig the latter hunted up Special Officer Shaffer and that official visited Kelley at the lockup. By letters and other credentials Kelley satisfied Mr. Shaffer that he was all right and he was allowed his liberty.

# CAR INSPECTOR'S NARROW ESCAPE

Attempted to Cross Track in Front of No. 7 and Barely Missed Having His Life Crushed Out.

Just as Lehigh passenger train No. 7 rolled into the local station yesterday afternoon James Bixby, a car wheel inspector attempted to go across the track directly ahead of the locomotive, and the fact that he escaped with his life is considered a miracle by those who saw him. Bixby was standing on the east side of the track and as the train approached he started for the other side. His foot struck against the first rail and he fell to the ground face downward. His body struck a plank which lays between the two rails and he slid far enough from the outside rail to avoid being crushed under the wheels. The side of the pilot, however, struck him on the side of the face, cutting a gash of considerable length in his cheek. He went to the hospital for treatment.

## LEHIGH EMPLOYE KILLED IN THE COXTON YARDS.

Levi Courtright Run Down By an Engine and Crushed in a Frightful Manner.

Levi Courtright, an employe of the Coxton yard force, a resident of Pittston, was killed yesterday afternoon while at work. According to the most authentic report obtainable, the unfortunate man, while removing a piece of machinery from the rear end of one engine was struck by another that was backing down the same track. His abdomen was fearfully crushed and he died almost instantly. Courtright had been employed on the yard force of the Lehigh for many years.

## Thaw Jury Falls to Agree.

The Thaw Jury failed to agree upon a verdict and have been discharged. It is said that the jury stood seven for guilty and five for acquittal. Thaw was remanded to the Tombs and District Attorney Jerome will place him on trial again. Judging from the record of the past it is exceedingly doubtful if the district attorney can secure a conviction. Past experience with cases similar in their character are decidedly against the district attorney and it looks like a useless waste of the people's money to place Thaw on trial a second time. Might better release him and let him and Evelyn take that contemplated trip to France, provided they will both agree to never return. It would be a good riddance of a decidedly unsavory pair.

# WHEEL FOUNDRY EMPLOYE BURNED

John Watkins Met With a Painful Accident While at Work Yesterday Afternoon.

John Watkins, an employe of the Cayuga Wheel Foundry, was seriously burned yesterday afternoon about five o'clock by an explosion of gas. He was standing near one of the furnaces when the gas exploded with a loud report. He appeared to realize that an explosion was about to occur and covered his face with his hands, thereby protecting his face from what may have been serious burns. As it was his clothing was nearly torn from his body and he was taken to his home in Milltown suffering terribly. Beyond their being exceedingly painful his injuries are not considered serious.

## ILLEGAL TRAIN RIDERS ROUNDED UP TODAY.

Brace of Toughs From New York City Remanded to the Lockup Until Their Records Can Be Investigated.

Frank O'Brien and Abram Frank, two tough specimens of the human race, who claim New York city as their place of abode, were arrested in the Lehigh Valley yards this morning by Special Officer D. J. Kendig, charged with beating their way on a Lehigh Valley Railroad train. The two men were taken before Justice of the Peace W. T. Carey, and after being questioned were remanded to the lockup for a hearing to be held later in the afternoon. Both men are believed to be crooks and their history will be closely investigated. They say that they are on their way to Chicago where they expect to obtain work. A temporary charge of illegal train riding has been placed opposite their names on the police court records.


