"There have been many combinations in the temperance movement, in all of which I have more or less sympathy, but there are times when one wants to get rid of all ornaments and embellishments and see the work ahead. There fell a shadow across the hearts of not a few when a decision was made in the W. C. T. U., a little while ago to affiliate with a political party. It was one of those mis-takes that was worse than defeat. I hope you will rally round you the thousands who have felt that they could not enscientiously follow where the other organization led."

Rev. Dr. Young followed with a eulogy on the grand work that the W. C. T. U., had done, though he T. II. had done, though deprecated the mistake they made in "leaving the legitimate field in which they had won such victory."

During one of the solos by Mrs. Weevle a gentleman in the audience sent word to the platform that he wished to sign a total abstinence pledge, and when one was written he promptly signed it. The president of the evening, in her closing words, referred to this as, "the first fruits of the new organization and an earnest of the future."
