REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

Headquarters of the Republican Standing Committee of Sullivan County.

LaPorte, February, 1st, 1890. Pursuant to a resolution of the County Committee, of Feb. 1st '90, there will be a Convention of the Republican voters of Sullivan county in the Court House at LaPorte TUESDAY MARCH 4th 1890, at 2 o'clock p. m.

The convention is called for the purpose of choosing one delegate to the State Convention and to transact such other business as shall properly come before the meeting. Delegate election will be held at the usual place of holding elections in the several districts on Saturday March 1st 1890, between the hours of 4 and 7 p. m.

Court Proceedings.

Court opened in due form on Monday with Hon. J. A. Sittler P. J. and E. A. Strong and Robt. Taylor his Associates on the bench. Constables called and made the usual returns.

A. A. Ludy appointed to wait upon the Grand Jury. P. B. Hopper appointed to wait upon the Traverse Jury. Patrick Farley and Theodore Roderer appointed to citizenship and sworn in open court.

McGuire vs Rouse In Equity, receiver discharged and bond cancelled. In re. assignment of Jno. Litzelman—Geo. Younk and Anthony Dempsey appointed appraisers. In re. guardianship of Dottie McIlwain—Jno. Frymire appointed guardian of said minor. Bond to be in sum of \$4000.

A. L. Shoemaker appointed guardian of Ella M. Holcomb—Bond \$1000. E. J. Snell appointed guardian of Donald Morgan—Bond \$600. Com'lth vs Daniel Pierce—Larceny—True bill. Dft. pleads guilty sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 and cost and undergo imprisonment in county jail for 30 days.

Peddlers license granted to Mr. Shoemaker and A. C. Herly. Jno W. Walker appointed guardian of Catharn Deuce. Chas. F. Cheney appointed Constable of Shrewsbury twp., vice J. F. Bennett resigned.

Wm. Phillips appointed constable of Colley twp., vice. Thos. Canglely resigned. Reuben Brown appointed Constable of Fox twp., vice. Elmer Miller resigned.

Herleman Bros. vs Jno. Appleman—Court appoint Hon. B. S. Collins Auditor to distribute funds arising from Sheriff sale of dft's. personal property.

In re change of polling place for Forksville boro—Court authorize the matter to put to vote of the qualified voters of said boro. Com'lth vs Shultz Bros. Larceny—True Bill. Barton vs Gilbert—Rule to open judgment.

CHICAGO GETS IT!

The Windy City Gobbles the World's Great Fair.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The deciding struggle between the cities competing for the World's Fair commenced at noon, and resulted in a victory for Chicago. The hall of the House was so gloomy that the gas was lighted. The galleries were crowded in fact packed.

Chauncey M. Depew, Mayor Cregier, and a host of representative men were to be seen in the reserved galleries. Representative O'Neill, of Pennsylvania, opened the proceedings by presenting John E. Keyburn, the successor of the late Representative Kelley, of Pennsylvania. Mr. Keyburn took his place before the bar and was sworn in by the Speaker. The Clerk read the special order of the House prescribing the method

of voting upon the site for the fair, requiring some one place to have a majority of the votes cast. Mr. Blount, Georgia, wished to know if there would be an opportunity afforded to pass upon the question as to whether there shall be a fair before selecting a site. The Speaker replied that under the special this opportunity could not be had, and directed the Clerk to call the roll. There was some applause as the first few responses were made, which was promptly checked by the Speaker.

THE FIRST BALLOT. The first ballot for choice of site resulted as follows: Chicago, 115; New York, 72; St. Louis, 61; Washington, 56; Cumberland Gap, 1.

Necessary to a choice 154. SECOND BALLOT. Chicago, 121; New York, 83; St. Louis, 58; Washington, 46.

THIRD BALLOT. Chicago, 127; New York, 92; St. Louis, 53; Washington, 34.

FOURTH BALLOT. Chicago, 134; New York, 99; St. Louis, 48; Washington, 29.

FIFTH BALLOT. Chicago, 140; New York, 110; St. Louis, 38.

SIXTH BALLOT. Chicago, 149; New York, 116; St. Louis, 28.

SEVENTH BALLOT. Chicago, 153; New York, 106; St. Louis, 29.

EIGHTH BALLOT. Chicago, 157; New York, 107; St. Louis, 25.

Chicago reached on this ballot three votes more than were necessary and thus gets the fair. The announcement was applauded and the House adjourned.

THE FINAL STRUGGLE. On the seventh ballot a majority would be 153, and Chicago had 154, just two votes short. There was an agony of expectations when Mason dragged Reyburn, the new member, forward. He said he wished to change his vote from New York to Chicago, and did so. He was greeted with applause, and evidently expected to lead a stampede for Chicago, but he was disappointed. No body followed his example, and Chicago's total stood at 155, one less than a majority. The New York forces were retiring in good order and contested every inch of the ground, so another roll call was necessary. It was the eighth and last, for Chicago achieved her victory, and out of the total of 307 votes received 157, three more than a majority.

Chicago Wild With Joy. CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—The street scenes in Chicago this afternoon and evening told of the enthusiasm unmistakably. The incidents were not unlike those familiar to every one when a national convention is on. To-night the toots of resurrected election horns mingle every few minutes with the boom of cannon on the lake front, and at all the clubs, hotels and other resorts, the coming of the World's Fair to Chicago is being celebrated with a vim.—Ex.
