REGARDING THE CENSUS WORK Individual and Corporation indebtedness.

The interest in the approaching time of census taking, and the completeness with which the work is to be done, has awakened considerable inquiry.

At the census office in Washington there have been received thousands of letters asking for information on the subject, and Robert P. Porter, Superintendent of Census, has issued a bulletin in reply to a Senate resolution to have the matter more fully set forth and explained.

Speaking of these questions, Mr. Porter says that it is impossible to secure reliable data in relation to the value and ownership of property, or the amount of private indebtedness of individuals directly through the medium of enumerators.

Mr. Porter, in his census bulletin to Congress, gives many facts of interest to all classes of people, and sums up by saying that it is the purpose of the office to make the investigation thorough and as nearly accurate as may be, to the end that the eleventh census may show the actual situation of the people in respect of financial prosperity, and may furnish foundation for comparison with the results of censuses to be taken in the future.

It should be borne in mind that these addresses, unlike those obtained from the real estate records by abstractors of indebtedness, and referred to hereafter, will not be subject to any considerable change in the short time elapsing between their collections and the forwarding from the census office of the circular of inquiry.

Other advantage is found in the fact that the enumerator is a local man and mostly known to the person to whom inquiry is directed. It is therefore fair to assume that the persons called upon who are in debt will more cheerfully answer questions on a blank sent to them by the Superintendent of Census than they will the local enumerator.

The results to be obtained are important. The financial transactions of the people, as far as indicated by recorded mortgages, will be ascertained for the ten years from 1880 to 1890.
