DRUMMERS ON THEIR METAL.

Active Warfare Waged Against the New Postmaster at Oswego, N. Y.

CINCINNATI, June 1.—The State Council of United Commercial Travelers of America in session here yesterday adopted vigorous resolutions against the appointment of John A. Place, editor of Oswego (New York) Times, as post-master of that place on account of his stalling in an editorial that "The term drummer has become synonymous with that of profligate and masker."

The council characterizes his appointment as postmaster as a direct to 250,000 traveling men, and President Harrison and Post Master General Wanamaker are to be requested to move him.

The Closing Canvass.

During last week twenty-seven delegates were elected to the Republican State Convention, being sixteen in Allegheny, two each in Beaver, Lebanon and Huntingdon, four in Lehigh and one in Perry.

The thirty-nine delegates from Philadelphia have been practically selected, although the primaries do not take place until to-morrow.

There is a contest in but one district, so that the names of thirty-eight of the number are as well known now as they will be after the conventions. This leaves but twenty-four delegates yet to be named, and they will come from the following counties: Chester, 4; Forest, 1; Fayette, 3; Jefferson, 1; Montgomery, 5; Pike, 1; Somerset, 2; Washington, 3; Westmoreland, 4.

It is possible that the decisive delegates may be turned up in the elections yet to come, few as they are. The nomination is not yet settled. Each candidate has a free field, and one or two have been recently making up some of the time lost earlier in the campaign.

In these closing contests everything calculated to stir up bitterness should be avoided. It is a contest among Republicans, and the followers of the several candidates can well afford to imitate the candidates themselves and maintain the friendliest relations with each other.

Such a course will make matters much easier after the nomination is settled, when ever faithful Republican will want to fall in line under the banners of the nominee.

The convention will be entirely competent to nominate a candidate who will represent the best interests of the party and be the choice of its people. Having done this, the Republicans voters can be safely intrusted with the duty of selecting the ticket in November.

A Dignified Contest.

The Philadelphia Times is free to confess that the contest for the Republican nomination for Governor has been up to this time a contest between men in which the candidates have kept level heads and given all disputants for place a "memorable example of manhood in the inevitable conflict of ambition."
