The President has been indulging in some plain private talk in a pleas. ant way on the pension question to republican members of Congress. The present status of the matter is what brought the President out, The Senate has passed the depend ent pension bill substantially as it was when vetoed by Mr. Cleveland. The House passed as a substitute for this bill the Morrill service bill which is both a dependent and a service bill. This substitute the Senate has refused to recede from its position and the whole matter has been referred to a conference committee. The President has determined that this failure to agree on the part of the House and Senate shall not prevent some pension legislation at the present session if he can help it, and he has been urging the necessity of such legislation upon members of his party. He has not committed himself in favor of either bill, but it is evident that he thinks one or the other of them should become a law without any unneccessary delay.

DRUMMERS ON THEIR METAL Active Warfare Waged Against the

New Postmaster at Oswego, N. Y.

CINCINNATI, June 1.-The State Council of United Commercial Travelers of America in session here yesterday adopted vigorous resolutions against the appointment of John A. Place, editor of Oswego (New York) Times, as post-master of that place on account of his statlng in an editorial that "The term drummer has become synonymous with that of profigate and masher. They go to a city, and when night relieves them of their duty their time is spent in looking up weak and foolish girls, who are pleased by their lies, flattered by their attentions, and who become an easy prey."

The council characterizes his appointment as postmaster as a direct to 250,000 traveling men, and President Harrison and Post Master General Wanamaker are to be requested to move him.

The Closing Canvass.

During last week twenty-seven delegates were elected to the Republican State Convention, being sixteen in Allegheny, two each in Beaver, Lebanon and Huntingdon, four in Dauphin and one in Perry. In Allegheny there was no contest, the delegation being given to Moontooth, with underneath layers for all the other leading candidates if Moontooth should be taken out of the field after a ballot or two.






