WASHINGTON, June 2.—Notice is
given by the Treasury Department
that the principal and accrued in-
terest of such of the four and one-
half per cent. bonds issued under
the acts of July 14, 1870, and Janu-
ary 30, 1871, as may be outstanding
on the 2nd of September, 1891, will
be paid on that day, and that the
interest on said bonds will then
cease.
