Cleveland's Letter. Grover Cleveland's letter of acceptance, the expectation of the coming of which has been keeping the Democrats uneasy for a long time, was sent flashing over the wires Monday. It evidently required a vast amount of hard thinking on the part of the Democratic candidate, with the assistance of the best brains at national headquarters, to get the document in presentable shape...

As was to be expected Mr. Cleveland endorses the principles of the party whose standard bearer he is; he endorses and approves the pernicious free trade plank of the Chicago platform, and stands before the people on the very issue he created by this famous message which caused his overwhelming defeat. It may be called "tariff reform" or any other name, but the people will not lose sight of the fact that the party that nominated Cleveland, and the nomination that Cleveland now accepts, denounces "Republican Protection as a fraud."

The letter will be found interesting, and is deserving of careful reading. Both the leading candidates have now been heard from, both have expressed themselves on the issues, and the people are to be the judges. The one stands for Protection and Prosperity, the other for tariff reform and Free Trade.

HE IS A REPUBLICAN NOW. A Prominent Gotham Democrat Comes Out Boldly for Protection. NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Leon Cohen, who was the County Democratic candidate for Senator in the Ninth district last year, has written a letter to Charles A. Jackson, executive chairman of the County Democracy, resigning from the Organization Committee and the Committee of Twenty-four. He announces that he is through with the Democracy.

His change of heart, he declares in his letter, is dictated by the interests of the workingman, honest money and an honest ballot. For the workingman, he says, "there is no better doctrine than that of protection for American labor."
