MAY BE BUMPED BY A BIG COMET. A Huge, Fier Mon er Rapidly Coming Phis Way.

SHS WIL APPEAR MATTIMES LARGER THAN A

NEW YORK, Nov. 18-If the met discovered by Holmes on the light of November 6 really proves to be part of the lost comet of Biela. s some astronomers now believe the "hairy star" will be a very close aeighbor of ours on November 2: the date of its nearest approach t he earth.

It is not likely to hit us, but eve f it does it will get the worst of to crash. Far from doing any dama the collision would furnish a magni frent display of relested fireworks such as the crash on November 27: 1882, when the earth was crossing the old track of the lost comet, and again in November, 1886, when the earth once more cut through the met's path.

VERY CLOSE TO EARTH.

It is not, however, by any mea ertain that the mysterious wonder whirling directly toward us with ap palling volocity from the depths of space is Biela's comet. All the can at present be said is that it ap pears to be traveling in the direc tion taken by Biela's.

Not enough observations have far been made to give with any ac curacy the intruder's orbit. Professor Herberich's statement made o the world from Berlin November 10, that its orbit was the same a that of Biela's, has been contra dicted. Professor Pickering inclines to Professor Herberich'

views, but is not absolutely sure. Biela's comet is particularly interesting to us because its orbi lies within a tew thousand miles of the earth, so close according to Professor Young, of Princecon, tiet if the comet and the earth were to arrive at the nearest point at the same time there would be a collision, the earth passing through the outer portion of the opponent's head.
