FIGHT AGAINST CROCKER.

His Leadership of Tammany Hall Will Be Strongly Contested by Disappointed Members.

New York, Jan. 8.—The fight that has been brewing in Tammany Hall for some months is rapidly reaching a focus, and it will be a short time only when Richard Crocker's leadership will be disputed.

Ample evidence is already at hand that the moment a break appears in the ranks there will be a rush to muster under the banner of the opposition without regard to the form in which it maintains itself. Mayor Gilroy's administration promises to be one of great dash and brilliancy. Precedents are to be cast aside, great public improvements, like that of widening Elm street at a cost of three million dollars, will be ordered and carried out, as in the Tweed days, and the patient taxpayers will be called upon to foot the bill.

Then the trouble may begin. Hitherto Mr. Crocker has been one of the most discreet of men, but now it would seem that he has cast discretion to the winds, as when he issued his manifesto, declaring that he had no use for "business men" as such.

The disappointment in mercantile circles when Mayor Gilroy announced his first batch of political appointments on Wednesday was great. In Wall street and among banking men the feeling was one of severe censure. Meanwhile the politicians, who were forgotten in the distribution of patronage, and who have been buoyed by the hope of securing a snug political berth, are now ready to fight. They are willing to throw off the mask of friendship at the instant the call to arms is made.

With the appointments of John T. Scannell as Fire Commissioner the factional fight in Tammany Hall is intensified. Ex-Mayor Grant repeatedly refused to give Scannell an office, although urged to do so by Crocker. The fact that Mayor

Gilroy has yielded to the wishes of the Tammany chieftain indicates that Grant and Martin are among the outs.

Ex-Alderman Cavanaugh and others like him who have been abused by Crocker will gladly take part in any rebellion against his tyrannical decrees, and a Tammany man of prominence who was "lost in the shuffle" said yesterday:

"There will be an open revolt in Tammany before the robins nest again. Grant and Martin will not calmly be turned down, and they will avenge the insult conveyed through the appointment of Scannell."

THE WORK OF THE MAFIA.

A Country Storekeeper Gagged, Bludgeoned and Robbed, and Held a Prisoner for Several Days.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 9.—On November 24, last year, Henry L. Gregory, of Jordan River, Hancock county, Miss., a country storekeeper aged twenty-three, came to this city. The same day he mysteriously disappeared. Yesterday he turned up in Bay St., Louis, Miss., and told the following story:

"On arriving in New Orleans I started for a house on St. Charles street, when I met a well-dressed man who said he was a drummer for that house and offered to carry my valise. He invited me to take a drink. I went into a saloon with him and after drinking he said there was a man in the back part of the saloon whom he wished to speak to. I waited about five minutes and then thought I would hunt him up. The drummer as soon as I entered entered through a side door. Three remaining men locked the door behind me. Two of them drew revolvers and pointed them at me. I was then robbed, blindfolded and driven about four miles. Then we got to our journey's end. We entered a house and the gag and blind were removed. I had been here six or eight days when another man came around. He said the three men intended to kill me.

"When I had been in ten or fifteen days a new man was brought in. When the blindfold was removed from him he grabbed one of the men who shot him dead. About 6 o'clock Saturday night I was gagged and blindfolded, and as we put into a vehicle and driven about one block of the Morgue station. The men gave me a ticket on the Louisville and Nashville road to Bay St. Louis." The police attach importance to Gregory's story, and profess to believe his abduction was the work of the Mafia, as there have been several other sudden disappearances which have never been explained.
