BALLOT LAW CHANGES.

Amendments That are Likely to he Made to the Present L

Many changes have been suggested to the Baker Ballot Law as it now stands upon the statutes, and these have all been referred to a sub-committee of the House of Representatives, who have about agreed upon the tollowing :

"First, strike out of the ballots the residence of the candidates as being wholly unnecessary. It is in the nomination papers and that is sufficient. It only increases the size of the ballot by having it on them.

Second, a reduction in the nummer of ballots, as the large amount of unused ballots all over the state justifies us in doing so.

Third, have but one day, to wit, Monday, on which to deliver them to the judge. It is not only very expensive but difficult in some of the counties to deliver on one day, let alone two. Anyway it is looked upon as it is now as being the farcial fight awarded to the man fouled. If portion of the act.

Fourth, the time of the sheriff to make his proclamation is to be extended. As it is now it is impossible for him to fully comply with the day.

Fifth, the validity of all certificates of nominations to be tested in the common pleas of the district where the nominations are made, ex. cept those made in state conventions, they to be tried in the courts of Dauphin county. 
