Court Proceedings.

The regular September term and sessions of the several courts of Sullivan county, convened on Monday Sept. 18, 1893, at the public school building in the Borough of Laporte, at 2 o'clock p. m. Present, Hon. John A. Sittler, President, and Hons John Youkin 2d, and M. J. Phillips, Associate Judges on the Bench. Grand jury called and sworn—T. S. Simmons appointed foreman. Constables of the several districts throughout the county, (except Forksville Borough) made their sworn returns in open court. T. J. Schug vs. F. H. Tomlinson; ruled granted to show cause why appeal should not be stricken off for want of bail. Edkin vs. Edkin; in Equity. John H. Cronin Esq., appointed master and examiner. Sieg vs. Sieg, alias subœna awarded. J. F. Strieby Esq., a member of the Bar of Lycoming county, was duly admitted to practice in the several courts of Sullivan county. Fred Thomson, Andrew Moralee and L. Sohn Lindh were admitted as citizens of the U. S. and sworn in open court. Com. vs. Stephen Brock; court permit a Nol. Pro. on payment of costs. Com. vs. Joseph Mastrola; case tried, verdict guilty, sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00, costs of prosecution, and 20 days in county jail. Jesse B. Everitt was appointed by the court as guardian of John F. Annable, he giving bond in the sum of \$750.00 and H. C. Pardoe as his surety. In re. sale of real estate of Mathias Gilbert dec'd., court direct administrators of said decedent to make sale of said real estate. Bond \$3000. C. W. Champion appointed collector of taxes of Dushore Boro. Michael Finnan an insolvent debtor, was discharged. In re. estate of Wm. Lambert, dec'd., court direct a citation to issue to the administrator directing him to file an account. Tinkham vs. Tinkham; A. B. Kilmer appointed a commissioner in this case. Com. vs. John A. Phillips, court grant leave to enter a Nol. Pro. on payment of costs. Turney vs. Turney, alias subœna awarded. Com. vs. Morris Leverton; True Bill, case tried, verdict guilty, rule for a new trial granted. The court appoint Hon. B. S. Collins, E. J. Mullen and F. H. Ingham Esquires, as committee to examine students for admission to the Bar. Com. vs. John O'Brien and Com. vs. Lewis Stein; grand jury find True Bill in each case. On petition, T. J. Keeler appointed collector of taxes for Laporte Borough. Thos. Cadden, A. Plotts and W. C. Mason appointed viewers on road in Laporte township, from Isaac Low's to John O'Wilson's. And now to wit Sept. 19, 1893, Fred M. Rogers, a student in the office of Rudolph J. Thomson Esq., and A. J. Bradley, a student in the office of Hon. E. M. Dunham, were, on motion of Hon. B. S. Collins, duly admitted to practice law in the several courts of Sullivan county, and were sworn in open court. Henry Swank, Wm. Robbins and A. W. Hones were appointed viewers on a road between Hills Grove and Glen Mawr. Ulysses Bird, James Walsh and J. W. Rogers were appointed viewers on proposed road from Cherry Mills to Big Bottom Bridge. Haydee Hoagland vs. Wm. Hoagland; rule granted on respondent to show cause why libellant should not be allowed \$500 for support during pending of this suit, and A. A. Kilmer appointed commissioner. Purcell vs. Purcell; subœna in divorce is directed to issue. Com. vs. Jacob Caseman; grand jury find Not a True Bill, and the prosecutor, A. P. Rier to pay costs—prosecutor sentenced as above and committed. Dominico Santoli vs. the W. & N. B. R. Co., (2 cases), rule to show cause why plaintiff shall not enter bail for costs. Com. vs. Albert A. Porter; verdict guilty, prisoner sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00, and costs of prosecution, and 30 days in county jail. Gloth vs. Gloth, on hearing testimony in this case, divorce decreed on payment of costs. On motion the Hon. Leopold Kohinka a member of the Bar of

Albany, N. Y., was duly admitted to practice in the several courts of Sullivan county. Com. vs. A. A. Baker; Not a Bill and prosecutor Jean Gaultier to pay costs. Com. vs. M. J. Carmody (2 cases) grand jury find Not a True Bill, prosecutor Mary A. Thall to pay costs and defendant discharged. Com. vs. Robert McMahon; True Bill, case tried, verdict guilty. Defendant sentenced to pay \$5.00 fine, costs of prosecution and 20 days in county jail. John Utz vs. C. Earle, et. al. judgment in open court for want of an appearance. Welles & Co., vs. F. Baker, judgment for want of an appearance for the sum of \$350. Welles & Co. vs. F. A. Tushner, jr., judgment for want of an appearance. E. E. Fridenburg Esq., a member of the Bar of Bradford county, was duly admitted to practice in Sullivan county. Thos. Com. vs. Clarence Johnson; case continued until next term. Recognizance entered by deft. In re. estate of Henry Wanok dec'd. E. M. Dunham continued as auditor. Henry Mosier, M. J. Tripp and John Mullen were on petition appointed viewers on a county bridge between Cherry Mills and Dusliore Borough. The following matters were confirmed Ni. Si: Report viewers on county bridge over Muncy Creek near George Rea's. Report of commissioners regarding division of Cherry township. Report of viewers on roads in Davidson township, near Beaver Dam and Henlock Grove. Auditors report in estate of James Flanagan. Report of sale of real estate of J. T. Bedford dec'd. Report of sale of real estate of F. Morningstar dec'd. Final account of Ulysses Bird, Assignee of R. B. Warburton. Final account of Ransom Thrasher, Assignee of F. Hawk a tumbac. Final account of J. B. Lamberson sale of real estate of Hawk. Final account of F. G. Campbell, dec'd. Final account of Gabriel Richley dec'd. Report of sale of real estate by the assignee of John G and Geo. C. Wright. And now Sept 21, 1893, the Court of Quarter Sessions approve of the recommendation of two successive grand juries who have found the Court House unsafe for public use and have recommended the erection by the County Commissioners of such buildings as may be necessary for the accommodation of the courts, the several officers of the county, and for the confinement of prisoners. The sheriff is permitted to pay into court the fund arising from sale of defendant's personal property; and Hon B S Collins is appointed auditor to distribute said fund. L. M. 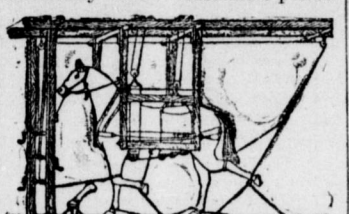
