SWEPT BY FLOODS.

Great Damage Done Throughout the State.

WILLIAMSPORT INUNDATED.

The heavy rains commencing on Thursday evening of last week and continuing until Tuesday of this week, brought destruction along the Valley of the West Branch of the Susquehanna; the like of which has never been known in the Valley except in June 1889. The city of Williamsport was inundated and much damage has been done. The water flooded her streets, being some four feet in depth about the Court House. All of the streets that lay low were flooded six and seven feet deep. The Reading R. R. tracks at their depot was covered with water some eight feet. The several booms gave away on Monday and all of the logs were swept down the river, also was three spans of the Market street bridge taken away.

The damage is great, but it is not thought it will be as great as that caused by the '89 flood. The Williamsport people experienced lots on the 1st of June '89, and with the coming of the heavy rains they scented danger, and all day Sunday people were busy moving their goods to places of safety and consequently
