NEW RAILROAD CHARTERED. A Line to Run Directly from Binghamton to Wyalusing. The Binghamton, Pennsylvania & Southwestern Railroad company has been incorporated at Harrisburg. This bare announcement in the city papers was of but little interest in this section; but when it is known that the road is to be built into Bradford county, then we want to know more about it.

Scranton capitalists are largely represented in the directory, and a stock of \$800,000 is subscribed. The new incorporation is an enterprise free from connection with the antiquated Williamsport and Binghamton project. It is proposed to run the road direct south from Binghamton to the Monneghan farm in Susquehanna county, on the state line. From this point the most direct line will be taken southwest to Wyalusing, on the Lehigh Valley railroad. The contemplated route will be about thirty-two miles long. If the road is built this far, it will be only a question of a very short time when a connecting link from Wyalusing to Satterfield is constructed, and the new route from Binghamton to Williamsport will be a reality.—E. S.

A German Prohibitionist Takes the Prize Winning Orator to Task. From the Williamsport Sun. THOMAS W. DAVIS—In regard to your expression last night in the opera house, I cannot help but correct you, namely: You said that every Irishman, German and Frenchman should die when they came into Castle Garden. My Christian friend, if you are a Christian, God only knows it; I do not believe it; if so, it is your and my duty to go on in the name of God and with the help of God, with good examples, in a polite way and manner and show and explain to the world the harm and the wrong that is in the liquor traffic. Only in that way will we gain an increase in numbers of Prohibitionists.

My friend you have no right to condemn any nation. God will judge them in due time. I know that the most harm is done by the foreigners in this line, but we must gain them in a different way than curse them. There are good ones and bad ones. I admit it, that there are bad ones coming over than good ones, but if you find nine rotten eggs out of a dozen, you need not throw them all away. If God had found ten righteous people in Sodom and Gomorrah he would not have destroyed it, neither did Christ, while on this earth, use such language to them that did not know any better. Four years ago I did not know it any better—did not see the harm in the liquor traffic—than any of them that come over now, but I was gained in a different way than you will gain them. If no foreigner had come here you would not be here yourself. The foreigners established this country. I thank you very much for your kind Christian compliment towards your fellow man.
