"EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, Aug. 27."  
"Hon. T. C. Catehings,  
"MY DEAR SIR:—Since the conversation I had with you and Mr. Clark, of Alabama, a few days ago, in regard to my action upon the tariff bill, now before me, I have given the subject further and most serious consideration. The result is I am more settled than ever in the determination to allow the bill to become a law without my signature. "When the information of legislation which it was hoped would embody Democratic ideas to tariff reform was lately entered upon by Congress, nothing was further from my anticipation than a result which I could not promptly and enthusiastically endorse. "It is, therefore, with a feeling of the utmost disappointment that I submit to a denial of this privilege. Yours very truly,

The Seventeenth Congressional District may be classed as doubtful. Columbia, Montour, Northumberland and Sullivan as a whole are solid enough usually—they gave 5303 in the Congressional contest of '92—but these are unusual times. Indeed, these counties slumped tremendously in February, and the coal county of Northumberland went heavily Republican—so heavily in fact, as to carry the whole district for Grow by 148 majority. It is not much of a margin, but the contest will not be allowed to lag and there is a fighting chance—more than that—to capture the district for protection.

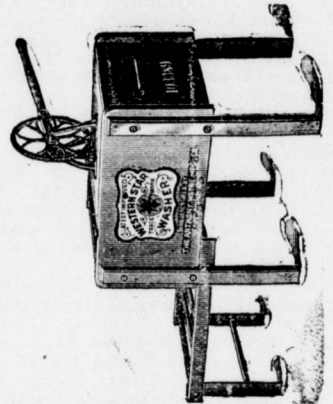

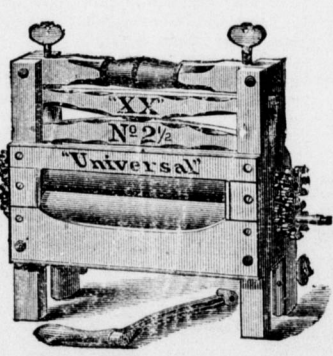

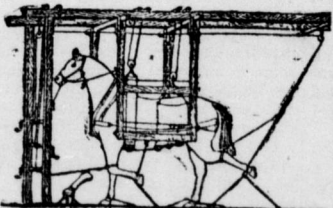
