It is evident to every business nan and property owner that for the past years, Laporte has been on the hope to complete the work in a week stand still so far as the erection of industries are concerned, Previous to the completion of our railroad, it was repeatedly said that with the railroad we will erect manufacturing enterprises and our town will boom. Instead of making our words good we have quietly folded our arms and seemingly are waiting to see our town go down.

It is apparent that one fact must stare every business man and proper-
