The rural members of the house are organizing to resist the proposed cut of \$2.000,000 in the school appropriation for the next two years. Their leaders will have a conference this week to outline a plan of cam-

The farmers hold the balance of any scaling down of the school funds. Many of them say there is no need of the cut. They caunot see why a balance of from \$3 000,000 to \$5,-000,000 should be deposited to the credit of the commonwealth in different banks throughout the State when the treasuries of the school districts are obliged to wait weeks and months before receiving their share of the school appropriation.

Dr. Schaeffer, superintendent of public instruction, thinks it would be unwise to reduce the school appropriation. He has been asked by Governor Hastings for his opinion on this question.

If the reduction becomes neces sary it will be the first time in fifty years, with a single exception, that the legislature has been compelled to diminish the amount of appropriation to the public schools by former legislatures. That exception occurred during the civil war when propriation has been steadily increas-
