But twice during the time of peace in this country has it become necessary for the government to make a bond loan to meet the current expenses. These occasions were under Buchanan and Cleveland when both branches of Congress were also under Democratic control. A great effort is being made by Democrats to avert the charge of incompetency, by calling attention to the fact that under Cleveland's first term the receipts exceeded the expenditures. This fact does not controvert our charge. From 1885 to 1889 the Senate was under control of Republicans and no Democratic policy was or could be adopted. The revenue laws were untouched and with the exception of controlling the offices, it made no difference who was president. But during the first two years of this term it was different. It was Cleveland and both houses of Congress democratic. This generation has had such an experience that it will see to it that there is no repetition.

To Tax Malt Liquors.

The Cochrane bill taxing malt liquors twenty-four cents a barrel of thirty-one gallons brewed for sale in the State passed finally in the House Wednesday, amid much excitement. The vote in favor of the measure was 104, or only one more than a constitutional majority. The nays were sixty-eight. The opposition to the bill made a hard fight to prevent its passage and are well pleased with their efforts. They are confident the measure will be killed in the Senate.

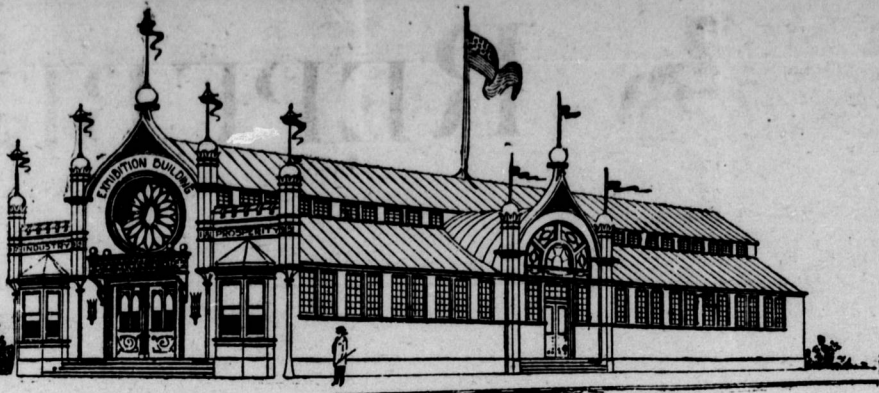
Langley's Machine Bird.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The Langley flying machine, which flew 1000 feet on a trial trip some days ago, is a marvel of mechanical ingenuity, delicacy and symmetry. Aluminum steel forms the greater part of its frame. Its boiler and engines weigh less than fourteen pounds to the horse-power, and the whole structure weighs less than the original safety bicycle. The horizontal plane section of the body has the contour of a mackerel, though all its transverse sections are circles. The machine is about eight feet long and the wings of fine oil-glazed silk are at their widest portion not over twelve inches across, with a spread of perhaps four feet each. They are the wings of the dragonfly rather than of the gull, whose motion in flying, Mr. Langley has studied so closely. Around one of the private rooms of the Smithsonian Institute are arranged scores of bird wings, extended, and exhaustive studies have been made of wing motion, bird flight and the action of the feathers in flight.

At a trial flight of the model not long ago, Prof. Langley and Alexander Melville Bell witnessed it together and when it sailed through the air these gentlemen, well passed middle age, danced with joy and hugged each other in their exuberance like a pair of school girls. While Hiram Maxim has spent much more money than Prof. Langley, and has been very successfully in producing a flying machine, Prof. Langley's work, it is believed, has proceeded along more permanent lines.—Ec.

To-day, Memorial Day, being a legal holiday, the bank and postoffice will be closed.

The income tax having been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court the constitutionality of the Wilson tariff law is next to be attacked by the alcohol manufacturers and importers. Lycoming County Centennial Exposition Building.

Above is reproduced a prospective view of the proposed exposition building, in which articles of historical and antiquarian interest will be exhibited during the summer. The structure is of brick, one story in height, 65 feet frontage on Pine street, extending 200 feet on Fifth street. The contract for erecting the structure has been let to D. P. Guise for \$5,500. The building will be completed by June 15 next, under forfeiture penalty of \$50 per day, with \$10 bonus for every day that it is finished prior to that date. It has been leased to the Centennial Association from June 15 next to March 1, 1896. It is the purpose to turn the structure into an armory at the expiration of the Association's lease. The plans are by Wagner & Reitmeyer, architects, of this city.

Court Proceedings.

The regular May term of the several courts of Sullivan county, convened at the court house in Laporte, on Monday, May 27th 1895, at 2 o'clock. Present—Hon. E. M. Dunham, President Judge and Hon. John Younk and M. J. Phillips, Associate Judges, on the Bench. Grand jury called and sworn; J. K. Bird appointed foreman. The several constables called, and made their sworn returns.

The hotel license of A. A. Oberholzer for the Laporte Hotel, was transferred to George L. Kessler.

W. W. Achenbach Esq., a member of the Bar of Lycoming county, was on motion, duly admitted to practice in the several courts of Sullivan county.

The court appoint Frank Bahl, guardian of Mary Krupper, Anna Krupper and Catherine Krupper; bail required in the sum of \$300.

The court appoint W. C. Rogers, guardian of Pearl W., Tracy J. and Lotie E. Bennett; bail required, \$600.

Milton Homat vs J. P. Little; J. H. Cronin Esq. is appointed auditor to distribute the fund in court, arising from sheriff sale of real estate of the defendant.

C. W. Reeder vs W. B. Snider; E. J. Mullen Esq. is appointed an auditor to distribute the fund in court, arising from sheriff sale of defendant's personal property.

The court confirmed Ni Si the Sheriff's returns in the following cases: Lippencott vs Meyler, Herrmann vs Dunn, Oslon vs McCarty, Hancock's Adm'rs. vs Dunn, and the same will be confirmed absolutely on May 29th, at 2 p. m., unless exceptions are filed.

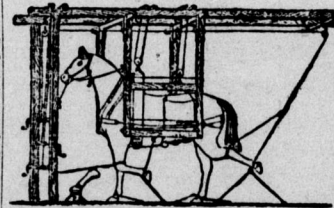

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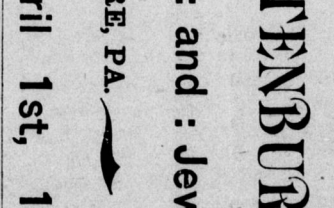
