Peck of the 18th district of Pennsylvania, presiding and Hons. John Kunkin and M. J. Phillips associate Judges on the bench. Orizo Bond was duly admitted as a citizen of the U. S. and sworn in open court. In re: Partition of real estate of Patrick Cangelly on petition and motion of Atty. Thomson for J. J. Connor the court ordered the said J. J. Connor to pay into court the sum of \$325.82, and that he be discharged from all liability and his recognizance can be cancelled. The license of the Laporte Hotel was transferred from George L. Kester to Russell Karpis. Bond approved. In re: Lunacy of Harvey McKay. The report of the inquest declaring the said Harvey McKay a lunatic was present and read in open court, and on motion of Atty. Downs, the fee of the commission is fixed at \$20. E. W. Hill of Shunk is appointed committee of said Harvey McKay; bond required in the sum of \$2000 with sureties to be approved by the court or a judge at chambers and it is ordered that the costs of executing this commission be paid out of the lunatic's estate. Case closed and given to jury on Wednesday morning. Jury went out until Thursday morning at 9 a. m. when they returned a verdict for plaintiff for \$16.00. Lewis Hunsinger vs Trexler Terrell & Co. Court grant a rule to show cause why the name of the defendant should not be changed so as to read "Trexler & Terrell Lumber Co." John Utz ex-Sheriff vs John W. Carroll. This was an action brought to recover damages for the removal of 15 sheep of the valuation of \$75 by John W. Carroll, while they were under levy by process in Sheriff's hands. Jury find for the plaintiff the sum of \$92. M. W. Botsford vs E. J. Gaynor Son & Co. This was an action on debt, to recover for merchandise sold deft. while they were constructing the W. & N. B. R. R. Charles Bartles, Trustee vs W. & N. B. R. R. Oct. 22, case continued on account of illness of T. J. Ingham. The whole of the argument list was continued for causes shown. ELECTION PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania: It shall be the duty of the Sheriff of every county, at least ten days before any election to be held therein (except for township and borough officers), to give notice of the same by proclamations posted up in the most public places in every election district and by advertisements in at least two newspapers, if there be so many published in the county, representing so far as practicable the political parties which at the preceding election cast the largest and next largest number of votes, and to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations, except for election officers and assessors to be voted for in such county, as far as may be in the form in which they shall appear upon the ballots and to designate the places at which the election is to be held. Therefore, I, Thomas Mahaffey, High Sheriff of Sullivan county, do hereby make known and proclaim to the qualified electors of Sullivan county that an election will be held in said county on

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 5th, 1895, at the several election districts in the county to wit: Bernice Precinct - at the Knights of Labor Hall in Bernice. Cherry twp. - at the new Township House, near Dushore. Colley twp. - at the Colley House. Davidson twp. - at the public house of Mrs. T. S. Magargle. Dushore Boro. - at the Hotel Carroll in said borough. Elkland twp. - at the Election House at Eldredsville. Forks twp. - at the Election House, Boro. - at the Hotel Carroll in said borough. Fox twp. - at the Township House at Shunk. Hillsgrove twp. - at the house formerly occupied by J. J. Sadler, Jamison City - at Kyle's Hotel. Laporte Boro - at the Laporte Hall. Laporte twp. - at the house of Henry Kohlen-sparzer. Lopez Precinct - at the School House in Lopez. Mount Vernon - at the Township House. Shrewsbury twp. - at the Eagles Mere Hotel. At which time and place the qualified electors will elect by ballot the following State and County officers:

A cross X marked in the square at the right of the name of each candidate, inside the line enclosing the column, indicates a vote for each candidate thus marked. If a cross X is marked within the circle it will be equivalent to a mark opposite every name in the column. Those who do not desire to vote a straight ticket must not mark a cross within the circle at the head of the column.

It is further directed that the election polls of the several districts shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon and continue open without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when polls will be closed. Notice is hereby given that every person holding an office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States or this State or city or incorporated district whether a commissioner or otherwise a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative executive or Judiciary department of this State or of the United States or of any city, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select and common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to be then voted for. The inspectors and judges of the elections shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district to which they respectively belong before seven o'clock in the morning, and each inspector shall appoint one clerk who shall be a qualified voter of such district.
