Yesterday John Smith of Muncy was brought to this city and taken before Alderman Finley by Constable Feigles, on the charge of perjury in connection with the recent suit of Hess vs W. & N. B. R. R. company in which the plaintiff was awarded \$10,000 for the loss of her husband who was killed by an engine of the defendant near Montgomery. Smith was remanded to jail to await a further hearing.

Smith was one of the chief witnes ses for the plaintiff, and in his testimony stated that he was in the cab of the engine at the time of the accident, that the whistle was not blown as the engine approached the crossing at which the accident occurred, and also that there were no lights on the tender which struck the wagon and killed its occupant. The defence has the testimony of the engineer and the conductor of the train who state that Smith was not in the cab at the time and of two other witnesses who were on the tender and who say that they did not see Smith on the engine.
