A SIMILAR CASE. For Fourteen Long Years. Wilkes Barre, Jan. 30.—Joseph Bellas, who was convicted to-day of attempting to assault a 7-year-old girl, was sentenced by Judge Lynch to separate and solitary confinement in the penitentiary for fourteen years and nine months and \$1000 fine. Judge Lynch said if little girls could not be protected it was not his fault.
