SHORT, SHARP AND DECISIVE.

With simplicity in keeping with republican institutions, the war which has raged between Spain and the United States for a period of three months and twenty-two days was quietly terminated Friday after- was doing business in town Tuesday. noon, when Secretary Day, for the United States, and M. Cambon, for Spain, in the presence of President McKinley, signed a protocol which will form the basis of a definite trea-

Within half an hour after the signing of the protocol the President prepared and promulgated a proclamation declaring a cessation of hostilities. Immediately thereafter cablegrams were sent to General Shafter, at Santiago; General Miles, at Ponce; and General Merritt, at Manila, signed by the Secretary of War. The Acting Secretary of the Navy at once cabled Admiral Dewey, at Manila, and Admiral Sampson at Santiago.

During the progress of the war the administration at Washington has been confident of success, thereby reflecting the confidence of the people of this Republic. The administration has received constant commendation from the people. There were no days, of gloom; save one.
