

A second reason is that it is not an offense for a man to give employment to many hund-reds of men.

Every effort to use the latter argument against a man in this State has failed. The man of means who puts those means in a great plant for the double purpose of employing his capital at a fair profit and at the same time giving work to labor is the last man in the world, assuming that he deals fairly with his men, for laboring men to oppose.
