S. S. ROGERS VS HERALD.

The Herald's Tactics In Local Politics Are Un- popular, and Indicates that Something GREATLY NEEDS TO BE RESTRICTED

In reply to the Herald's campaign

That on or about August 1, 1899,

land, came to my house and then
and there repeated the substance of
an article that had recently appeared
in the Sullivan County Herald to the

ments as published in the Sullivan
