

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

Whereas by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania it shall be the duty of the Sheriff of every county at least ten days before any election to be held therein (except for township and borough officers) to give notice of the same by proclamation posted up in the most public places in every election district and by advertisements in at least two newspapers if there be so many published in the county representing so far as

practicable the political parties which at the preceding election cast the largest and next largest number of votes and to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations except for election officers and assessors to be voted for in said county so far as may be in the form in which they shall appear upon the ballots and to designate the places at which the election is to be held. Therefore, I, H. W. Osler, High Sheriff of Sullivan county, do hereby make known and proclaim to the qualified electors of Sullivan county that an election will be held in said county on Tuesday,

November 7, 1899, at the several election districts in the county, to wit: Bennece precinct, at the Knights of Labor hall in Bennece; Cherry township, at the new township house near Dushore; Colley township, at the Colley House; Davidson township, at the public house of Ellis Strank in Sonesetown; Dushore Borough, at the Town Hall in said borough; Ellikland township, at the new election house at Elliklandville; Forsville Borough, at the Forsville house in said borough; Fox township, at the township house at Shank; Hillsport township, at rooms in house of Mrs. Emma Sandler beneath the hall of I. O. O. F. in said village; Jamison City precinct, at Kiles Hotel; Laporte Borough, at the ladies' waiting room in the Court House; Loper township, at the house of Henry Kohlenberger; Loper precinct, at public hall known as Loper hall; Mt. Vernon precinct, at the township house.

It is further directed that the election polls of the several districts shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon and continue open without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed. Notice is hereby given that every person elector will elect by ballot the following state and county officers, to wit: One person for State Treasurer, one person for Supreme Court Judge, one person for County Treasurer, two persons for County Commissioners, two persons for County Auditors.

At which time and place the qualified electors shall be present to vote. One person for State Treasurer, one person for Supreme Court Judge, one person for County Treasurer, two persons for County Commissioners, two persons for County Auditors.

Executive or Judiciary Department of this State, or of the United States or of any city or of any incorporated district and also that every Member of Congress and of the State Legislature and of the select or common council of any city or town or village or borough or township or precinct, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth and that no Inspector, Judge or other officer of any such elections shall be eligible to be then voted for. The Inspectors and Judges of the elections shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the elections in the districts to which they respectively belong, before seven o'clock in the morning and each Inspector shall appoint one Clerk who shall be a qualified voter of such district.
