The News Item Fights Fair

IT IS A PATRIOTIC HOME NEWSPAPER

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(Special Correspondence.)

Harrisburg, Aug. 13.--General Frank Reeder, chairman of the Republican state committee was here last week completing arrangements for the Republican state convention. The Opera House was engaged some weeks ago and the friends of the candidates and the leaders of the several county delegations are securing rooms in advance in anticipation of one of the largest convention crowds that has assembled here for some years.

The stalwart Republicans throughout the state are naturally anxious to get together to rejoice over the great victory achieved at the recent session of the legislature in the organization of both branches of the general assembly and the election of Colonel M. S. Quay to the United States senate.

After the bitter struggle of the last two years over the United States senatorship and the glorious victory that was the result, the regular Republicans will gather at the state capital this month to felicitate with each other and to map out plans for future victories for their party standard bearers.

BIG POLITICS AHEAD.

A gubernatorial campaign will shortly be inaugurated and the rank and file of the party will be eager to line up for the choice of the stalwart element and be prepared to meet every move of the insurgent contingent and their Democratic allies, to supplant the regular Republicans in the control of the affairs of state.

The Republican leaders are quite willing to rest their case upon the record of the administration of Governor Stone, and they feel that they have nothing to explain or excuse, nor have they any reason to be concerned about the outcome. The coming canvass of the state they are willing, shall be made exclusively upon state issues and they say they are eager to meet the people and the tax payers, especially, upon every question that may be raised during the contest.

READY TO MEET FUSION.

Whether their shall be fusion or no fusion, between the Democrats and the insurgents in the state campaign, does not in the least concern the regular Republicans. In fact, they would prefer that the so called fusion program be carried out, and that the voters of the state shall be given an opportunity at the earliest possible moment to decide the issue as to whether the Republican party or the Democratic party, with its insurgent adjunct, shall be held accountable for the administration of the affairs of the commonwealth in the various departments of the state government which will be affected by the coming election.

Outside of the Wanamaker campaign in Philadelphia to elect Wanamaker's counsel to the office of district attorney, where the insurgents and some of the Democrats have gotten together to further personal ends, there is practically no movement looking to the amalgamation of the insurgent Republicans and the Democrats in the state.

Wanamakerism seems to be on the wane among the voters of this commonwealth, especially in the country districts, where the personal politics of the ambitious millionaire of the Quaker City are more closely scrutinized than they are in the busy municipalities of the state.

A BIG CROW EXPECTED.

Judging from the number of rooms already engaged at the leading hotels there is going to be a very large attendance at the Republican state convention next week. The country leaders will all be on hand and many of their most active lieutenants and their supporters will also be here to participate in one of the most interesting gatherings of stalwart Republicans that has been held in Pennsylvania for a long time.

There will be harmony in the proceedings of the convention, for the number of delegates who will not be in entire sympathy with the leaders of the party in directing the affairs of the convention will be infinitesimal.

Philadelphia and Allegheny, which for years were more or less antagonistic in state politics, will be practically unanimous in support of the program that will be agreed upon by the stalwart leaders.

HARMONY IS ASSURED.

They will be in hearty accord with the platform that will be prepared after the leaders of the various sections of the state get together, and the ticket which will be nominated will be the unanimous choice of the delegates from all the counties.

For state treasurer, only one name has thus far been mentioned as likely to be presented to the convention. Representative Frank G. Harris, of Clearfield county, who made a splendid record at the last session of the legislature and who was especially prominent as a champion of the pure butter interest in the passage of the anti-oleomargarine

bill, has virtually a walkover for state treasurer.

No one doubts that Justice Potter, of Allegheny, will be given a spontaneous nomination to succeed himself on the supreme bench. He is one of the best known members of the bar and stalwart Republicans of western Pennsylvania.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED TO THE CITIZENS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth in General Assembly met, That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.

Amendment One to Article Eight, Section One. Add the end of the first paragraph of said section, after the words "shall be entitled to vote at all elections," the words "subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact," so that the said section shall read as follows:

SECTION 1. Qualifications of Electors. Every citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections, subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact:

1. He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

2. He shall have resided in the State one year (or, having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months,) immediately preceding the election.

3. He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. If twenty-two years of age and upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election.

Amendment Two to Article Eight, Section Seven. Strike out from said section the words "but no elector shall be deprived of the privilege of voting by reason of his name not being registered," and add to said section the following words, "but laws regulating and requiring the registration of electors may be enacted to apply to cities only, provided that such laws be uniform for cities of the same class," so that the said section shall read as follows:

SECTION 7. Uniformity of Election Laws.--All laws regulating the holding of elections by the citizens or for the registration of electors shall be uniform throughout the State, but laws regulating and requiring the registration of electors may be enacted to apply to cities only, provided that such laws be uniform for cities of the same class.

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the Eighteenth article thereof.

Amendment.

Strike out section four of article eight, and insert in place thereof, as follows:

SECTION 4. All elections by the citizens shall be by ballot or by such other method as may be prescribed by law: Provided, That secrecy in voting be preserved.
