Some Singular Errors About Eagles Mcre

A Philadelphia correspondent writes about a notable feat by Mr. John H. Swinburg of that city in swimming the length of Lake Eagles Mere. It speaks of the distance being a mile and three quarters and if he means that the round trip from one end to the other and back is that long it is approximately correct but the article reads as if the lake was one mile and three quarters in length. The other statement was that the temperature of the water was fifty degrees when in fact it was probably seventy degrees. Really the temperature of the water in Lake Eagles Mere does not vary greatly in any part of it from that of the bathing beach and at no time in any summer has any such figure been reached as it is represented this swimmer had to deal with. The temperature of the water from the bottom of the artesian wells is about from forty two to forty four and is about as cold as one cares to drink it.

Thre is no danger of cramps at any time in our lake from the coldness of the water.

Another statement was that the thermometer went down to thirty six in the middle of the summer. It would be a sufficient answer to this interesting fiction to say that on the lawns of most of the attractive cottages of our place are beds of sensitive flowers that would be ruined in one night with any such conditions. The fact is that at 6:30 in the morning of June 25th the thermometer stood at fifty and this was the lowest figure in daylight this summer. While this summer seems to be characterized as the coolest in many years there has been no time when the visitors were not comfortable as is clearly evident in the larger number than have ever been here before and that they stayed is an unerring indication that they were enjoying it.

Eagles Mere has never made better record for itself than in this year of Grace 1902. With some changes in methods that it is hoped may be brought about it is destined to continue to grow as it has done. 
