It is further directed that the election polls of the several districts shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon and continue open without interuption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed. Notice is hereby given that every person except, Justice of the Peace who shall hold an office or an appointment of profit or trust under the United States of this state or city or corporated district, whethstate or city or corporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary Department of this State or of the United States or of this State or of the United States or of any city or of any incorporated district and also that every Member of Congress and of the State Legislature and of the select or common council of any city or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office of adpointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of an election of this Commonwealth and that no Inspector, Judge or other officer that no Inspector, Judge or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to be then voted for. The Inspectors and Judge of the election shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the districts to which they respectively belong, before seven o'clock in the morning and each Inspector shall appoint one Clerk who shall be a qualified voter of such district.
