IN POLITICS TO STAY. Futility of Placing Tariff Matters In the Hands of a Commission.

It is impossible by any human device

to take the tariff out of politics with out changing our government from re-public to absolute monarchy. The tariff and all other business matters with which congress deals were put into politics when the foundations of the republic were laid, and they will stay there. The fact that the tariff affects all the people in their business and do-mestic affairs instead of being a rea-son why it should be taken out of politics is the very reason why it cannot be taken out.

It is as natural and inevitable that there should be varying and conflict-ing views as to tariff taxation as that different sects of Christians should disagree on creeds, and it would be no more impracticable to bring all the churches, sects and denominations together on a common creed by appoint-ing a commission for that purpose than to get up tariff schedules satisfactory to all schools of political economists by the commission process. the commission process.


In the first place, a nonpartisan com-mission that could agree upon a bill is manifestly absurd. A commission to amount to anything would have to be bipartisan. A Democratic tariff commission-one appointed by a Democratic president-would have an antiprotection or tariff for revenue only majority. A Republican president would see to it that a protection ma-jority were appointed. But even if that impossibility were nonexistent and a strictly nonpartisan commission of tariff experts could agree upon a scheme that acreament would not scheme, that agreement would not take it out of politics. "All bills for raising revenue must originate in the house of representatives." Both houses of congress must pass upon every item of a revenue bill. The report of a commission could not be anything more than suggestive to congress. The power to levy taxes cannot be dele-gated by congress to any board, body or commission which it could create.

Supposing the report of a commis-sion to be presented to congress in the shape of a tariff bill, it is at once in politics, and in the most strenuous kind of politics. Not only the radical differences between parties have to be fought to a finish, but conflicting in-terests of industries and localities in-tensify the struggle. There is no encouragement in the precedent of the tariff commission that preceded the enactment of the tariff of 1883 to re-peat that experiment. The senate framed that measure, cunningly dodging around a constitutional provis on, and a marvelous ruling by Speaker Keifer sent it to a conference committee without giving the house a chance to consider it. And that tariff did not follow the lines laid down by the commission.

The country has had too many commissions of various kinds and too much money has been wasted in that way. It were far better for both the legis lative and executive departments to do the work assigned to them by the constitution than to attempt to farm it out. And as our government is, and in its very nature must continue to be, a government by party, it must always be impossible to get national taxation out of politics .- Washington Post.

A Wrong Idea.

While the Democrats are talking that the combines whose products are protected by the United States tariff sys-tem should be cut out of such protec-tion because they have outgrown the necessity for protection, it develops that such are not the facts. A conspicuous instance is that the rolling mills of Europe are called upon now to work at their full capacity to help the mills of this country to supply the de-mand for steel products. Other iron goods are also needed beyond the capacity of American plants. With the tariff kept at the protective point American plants will be enlarged to do all the work necessary for this conn-try. With the tariff taken off, with Democratic free trade the European


