Charles Bryan, Wallace Snell and Myron Williams Charged With the Offense.

The big dam used for splashing purposes on the Loyalsock creekfour miles above Hillsgrove was partially destroyed by dynamite Monday. The work was done by Charles Bryan, it is said, who took the precaution to station guards be. low and above the dam, to keep people who might be passing along the road out of danger. Mr. Bryan has a farm on the flats above the dam which he finds is damaging to his property at this season of the year. The dam is owned by the Emery Lumber company, and is date, Dr. E. W. Samuel, of Mt.Carused to splash the logs down the stream when the water is too low to float them successfully without it,

The owners of the dam knowing that Mr. Bryan complained about the dam, prevented him carrying out threats by keeping H. L. Chilson constantly on guard. It was while Chilson was at dinner Monday that Bryan appeared at the dam and is alleged to have placed twenty sticks of dynamite in the two wicket holes and set them off. With him were Walace Snell and Myron Williams whom he stationed as guards along the public road which parallels the creek. The explosion tore out the gates, badly damaging the shoot walls and flumes.

Mr. McEwen foreman for the lumber company, was at Laporte Wednesday preparing for legal action against the offenders. Mr. Bryan claims to have acted in accordance with good council. The prospects for a big lawsuit is open and the question to be raised aside from being responsible for the damage done, those who took part in the affair may be made to answer for interfering with the navigation of a public stream. For this offense, the legislature has passed a law meant for the protection of lumbermen and others using navigable streams providing a penalty of three years in the penitentiary. Warrants were served on Bryan, Snell and Williams Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. McEwen said he would commence at once to repair the dam which would require two weeks or more with a large force of men. Draw gates will be put in for temporary use. The Lyoalsock drive has not yet reached the dam and for this reason the damaged parts will be hurriedly patched.

Republicans Mect.

The Sixteenth district Republican congressional conference was held at Danville Tuesday for the purpose of electing two delegates to the national convention at Chicago with their alternates, and a presidential elector.

The conference named as delegates Messrs James Foster, of Danville, and E. E. White, of Mt. Carmel. Alternates, Col. Charles Clement, of Sunbury and Fred P. Vincent of Sullivan county. Elector, W. C. McConnell, of Shamokin.

The conferees will meet at a later date and choose a candidate for congress. So far Northumberland county is the only one to endorse a candi-

Hon. John P. Elkin Nominated.

The Republican state convention was called to order at 10 o'clock a. m. Wednesday, in the opera house at Harrisburg. Hon. Thomas II. Capp, of Lebanon, was unanimously chosen temporary chairman. Resolutions were then adopted providing for the various committees. Speaker Harry Walton, of Philadelphia, named J. P. Elkin for supreme court justice, in a speech which received much enthusiasm. It was seconded by Frank McClain and carried by a unanimous vote.

Fred P. Vincent Appointed.

Senator Quay has decided upon Fred P. Vincent the assistant appraiser at Philadelphia and the nomination will be made by the President, to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Linn Hartranft, a numbes of months ago. The position har been left vacant for so long that there has been endless speculation as to the recommendation that will be made.

Another good place in Pennsylvania will be a judge of the Eastern district of this State. Congress has just provided an additional judge for the Eastern district, owing to the increasing business before the District Court of that part of the State.

The President has not yet signed the bill, but will do so in a day or two. It is generally understood that James B. Holland of Montgomery county, the present United States Attorney for the Eastern district will be elevated to the judgeship.

After two days' consideration of the postoffice appropriation bill, the senate committee reported it, and it was taken up in the senate.

Among the important amendments to the bill are the following: The salaries of rural free delivery carriers are fixed at \$720 a year, and the carriers are permitted to carry merchandise for hire and receive subscription for and deliver newspapers and periodicals so long as this occupation does not interfere with the proper discharge of their duties. It is stipulated, however, that the carriers shall not discriminate against tel and one at the Hall both were any newspaper which desires to avail itself of the privelege of employing them. Senator Clay's amend ment increasing the salary of the purchasing agent for the postoffice department \$4500 and requiring that all supplies must be bought by com. petitive bids, the contracts to be given to the lowest bidders, and that schedule of the bids must be sent to congress annually, was adopted.

The people of Bradford county are to be congratulated upon the establishment of rual free delivery of mail for the whole county. With the exception of a portion of Windham township for which the inspectors could find no feasible way to establish routes every house in the county will after May 1, have a daily deliv ery and collection of mail. This means much in more ways than one. The people should now do there part by promptly selecting and erecting proper mail boxes, and cheerfully comply with the regulation.
