17 60 143 18 Bishop Talbet Conducted a Pathetic and Dared to Cross Track Ahead of Engine. Unusual Ceremony Over Remains of Miss Electra Laver.

There is an unusually sad feature in connection with the death of Electra Lauer, the sixteen-year-old daughter of Letter Carrier and Mrs. Victor Lauer which occured on Saturday morning.

She was an attendant at St.D. vid's Episcopal church and a member of the class which was to be cenfirmed by Bishop Talbot yesterday. She looked forward to the event with much pleasure and pride and regretted exceedingly during her last days that her illness would probably prevent her confirmation.

Last Wednesday the rector, Rev. W. Fred Allen, was visiting her and after prayer, Miss Lauer thanked the rector, but remarked with much pathos that she grieved very much that she could not attend confirma-

"Don't worry, my daughter," remarked the rector, "if you are too ill on Sunday I promise you that the bishop will come here and confirm you in your room."

A glow of pride suffused her wan face and it was evident to all that the promise had brought joy to her soul. She frequently r ferred to her coming confirmation and it was one of the thoughts that brightened the evening of her young days amid the shadow of death. Saturday morning she passed peacefully away into the presence of the Great Bishop.

Yesterday afternoon Bishop Talbot fulfilled the promise to the dead and celebrated a ceremony as pathetic as it was unusual. After the rite of confirmation had been celebrated at St. David's church he drove up to the Lauer home and in the presence of the relatives and a few friends congreat indeed. The soldiers of 1861ducted the alternative office of blessing the remains. The ceremony was sad in the extreme and made an impress on the minds of those present which will never be forgotten.

#### Death of Mrs. George Kiess.

The long illness of Mrs. Geooge Kiess terminated with her death Tuesday morning, five minutes past 2 o'clock, at her home in Davidson township, where she was identified as one of Sonestown's oldest and most respected residents. For ten months she was rendered helpless by a stroke of paralysis which superinduced a complication of diseases and gradually weakened her system until death came peacefully to end her suffering. She was aged 67 years, 2 months and

Justin, who was about twelve years of age, was playing with a boy of about his own age near Hagerman's crossing. He was part way over when he caught his foot on a spike and fell. The train was nearly on him and before he could rise the engine struck him in the head. He lived until a few minutes after he had been taken to the Sayre hospital. His body was badly mangled.
