The report submitted to the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania Odd Fellows in session at Easton last week, show-4,953 during the year. Fifteen subordinate lodges had been instituted the members merging with other have a net gain of 28 lodges and

The report of Grand Secretary Joseph H. Mackey showed that the rewere \$57,374,58, \$30,131 42 being received from the per capita tax. Telephone Line will Expand.

The Bradford County Telephone company is to extend its system the coming summer to a connection with the independent rural lines and the independent systems in Canton and New Albany boroughs.

It seems almost incredible that in these days of civilization and enlightenment, that a human being could be so utterly depraved as to commit such extreme cruelty upon a dumb animal as that with which Jesse Weaver of Bernice is charged. Last week the superintendent of the Northern Anthracite mines of Bernice, sent a message to Officer Hollen of Towanda to secure the arrest of Weaver, charging him with pulling out the tongue of a mule of which he had charge at the mines. He was placed under arrest, but for some reasonmade his escape before being lodgedin jail.

Governor Pennypacker has fixed August 20, as Pennsylvania Day at the St. Louis exposition. It will be the anniversary of the battle fought by General Wayne against the Indians at Fallen timbers, within the territory of the Louisiana purchase, and was participated in by Pennsylvania troops.

Tuesday, June 14, will be the 127th anniversary of the stars and strips as flag of the United States. The day is not universally observed, although there is a growing tendency among the citizens of many places to decorate their buildings with the stars and stripes.

Offers to sell 15,000 acres of timber land for forestry reservation have been made to the forestry commission. The land offered is in various

The commission also made arrangements for protection of the reservements from devestation by fire and took action relative to the constables who fail to obey the law which requirss them to aid in the suppression of forest fires. The commission determined that any breach of duty of this kind reported will be summarily dealt with. A failure of a constable to perform the duty of fire warden is punishable by a fine and imprisonment.

A resolution was introduced directing commissioner Rothrock to notify the commissioners of the counties interested in cases where there are private reservations of minerals and timber on the lands otherwise held by the state so that the counties can tax the property owned by private individuals.
