The Good Roads law of Pennsylvania, approved April 15, 1903, appropriated \$500,000 for state aid to hasn't shown up yet. road improvement for the first year after the passage of the act, another \$500,000 for the second year, \$1,250, 000 for each of the two following years, and \$1,500,000 for each of the two years next following. The state appropriated in all \$6,500,000 for state aid to county and township road building, to be expended within six years after the passage of the

One full fiscal year has elapsed since the passage of the law, yet very little of the first year's appropriation has been expended. A second half tral Pennsylvania, with fine water, million dollors became available on is apportioned among the counties mileage of township or county roads in each county.

State aid to good roads in pennsylvania is a generous contribution Heim of Lancaster, Pa., are visiting of the municipalities to the country districts. There has been a slowness on the part of the country districts in recognizing the pecuniary advantage of this law.
