Rural Delivery Notes

The little town of Hope, Bartholo-
mew county, can boast of having the
first rural route carrier in Indiana.
When started it was one of the fa-
mous star routes. The first hack was
started along the route April 1, 1876.
Lewis T. Shultz, who carried the mail,
still holds the same position. Mr. Shultz
since he has been the carrier has trav-
eled 400,863 miles.

Ohio has over 1,300 rural free delivery
carriers, and the service covers the
state. The salary roll of this force
amounts to about \$65,000 a month.

Rural free delivery routes are not
self sustaining. The highest returns
from any state are from California,
where the average receipts are \$20 a
month and the average pay per carrier
is \$60 a month.

There are now about 25,000 rural free
delivery routes in operation in this
country and several thousand are es-
tablished every year.
