# ROOSEVELT-FAIRBANKS

## The People Elect by Tremendous Pluralties.

A Republican Landslide Sweeps the Nation  
From the Atlantic to the Pacific, Carrying  
With it All the Doubtful States.

## BREAKS ALL RECORDS.

Great Triumphs of the Party Achieved by McKinley  
Surpassed by the Tremendous Victory Won on  
Tuesday by the Leadership of Roosevelt.

PARKER THE WORST BEATEN  
CANDIDATE SINCE GREELEY.

Every Northern State Line Up in the Republican Column and  
Democratic Pluralties Throughout the South Cut Down.

A political landslide which surpasses anything in the nation's history  
with the possible exception of the overwhelming defeat of Greeley and  
Grant in 1872, brought victory to Roosevelt and Fairbanks.

With Maryland in the Republican column, Roosevelt has 325 elec-  
toral votes and Parker 151. Democracy's strength is thus reduced to  
the solid South. The entire North and West has rendered a mighty  
verdict of confidence in President Roosevelt.

In addition to the Nation's indorsement of the Republican Adminis-  
tration, the hands of the President have been strengthened by an increased  
Republican majority in Congress.

### STATE ROLLS UP 300,000 MAJORITY FOR ROOSEVELT.

Protection Policy Emphatically Indorsed  
By the People of the Keystone State.

The majority for Roosevelt and  
Fairbanks in Pennsylvania exceeds  
any ever before given in the State.  
The early returns indicate that it will  
go considerably above 300,000. There  
has been a tremendous increase in  
the Republican vote in nearly all sec-  
tions of the State and a slump in the  
Democratic vote in many. This is  
particularly apparent in Philadel-  
phia, Allegheny and other large  
counties.

The Republicans have carried 29 of  
the 32 congressional districts leaving  
the Democrats but 3, and those by  
reduced majorities. Every combi-  
nation against regular nominees in  
the districts has failed.

The Legislature will be over-  
whelmingly Republican. In the  
Senate there will be ten Democrats  
in a total of 50 members, and in the  
House not more than 39 Democrats  
in a total membership of 204. The  
Republican majority on joint ballot  
will be more than 100 assuring the  
election of Philander C. Knox to the  
United States Senate.

### It Was Phenomenal.

It is not only a year of phenom-  
enal votes but of phenomenal major-  
ities as well.

Beginning with the state of New  
York, which gives a Republican plu-  
rality of approximately 185,000, the  
tale runs throughout the country,  
Kentucky alone showing Democratic  
gains. Indiana is credited with at  
least 40,000 plurality, Iowa 125,000  
and Pennsylvania heads the list as  
the banner Republican state with the  
magnificent plurality of 325,000.  
Even in the southern states the vote  
has been light, Georgia's Democratic  
majority being only bet ween 30,000  
and 40,000. Texas will probably  
not exceed 100,000. Nevada, which  
was carried by Mr. Bryan four years  
ago, is Republican, and Montana,  
Idaho and Colorado, also Democratic  
in 1900, have gone back into the Re-  
publican column.

Delaware is estimated at about  
5,000 Republican; Massachusetts  
about 90,000, and Connecticut, in  
which the more sanguine of the Dem-  
ocratic leaders claimed to have had  
hopes, is about 25,900 for Roosevelt.

### PRESIDENT'S SUPPORT.

BIG GAIN IN HOUSE, OVER  
60 MAJORITY IN CONGRESS.

Continuance of Present Policies Under  
Speaker Cannon.

### GOOD POLICY APPROVED.

President Roosevelt will have a  
Republican Congress back of him  
when he enters upon his second Ad-  
ministration. The Republican ma-  
jority in the House of Representa-  
tives of the Fifty-ninth Congress  
will be at least 64. The returns so  
far received show 225 Republicans  
and 161 Democrats elected.

The overwhelming tide for Roose-  
velt and Republicanism has swept  
every district claimed as doubtful by  
the Democrats and in which there  
was a contest. Minnesota has re-  
deemed her one Democratic district  
by electing former Congressman  
Fletcher, of Minneapolis. New  
York has made notable gains and  
her delegation will stand 25 Republi-  
cans to 12 Democrats in the next  
House, instead of 20 to 17, as at present.

Chairman Babcock's conservative  
claim of 203 is more than justified, as  
the indications are for an increase  
of from 20 to 30 over that figure.

The result of the Congress fight is  
a verdict for Republican principles  
and an endorsement of Republican  
legislation.

## 244 MAJORITY ROOSEVELT'S GREAT SWEEP IN SULLIVAN.

Hon. E. M. Dunham Carries the County of Sul-  
livan By Fair Margin.

## FRANK BUCK ELECTED.

375 Plurality Given to Buck for  
Office of Sheriff.

Dr. M. E. Herrman Elected to the Legislature  
By a Majority of 212.

Big Vote in Wyoming County for Charles E. Terry  
Elects Him By a Majority Exceeding 600.

## THOMAS E. KENNEDY HAS 1004 MAJORITY.

The election returns of Sullivan  
county show a surprising vote for  
the Republican column. The popu-  
larity of Roosevelt's administration  
reached to all corners of the county.  
The republican vote in Bernice for  
the state and county would have  
been twenty larger had the ballot  
been marked properly. Five ballots  
in Laporte Boro. was also voted for  
the presidential electors alone, and  
the same report comes from nearly  
every election district. The vote of  
the county is here given as complete  
as possible to get before going to  
press.
