ment of the place. Mr. Milton Bots-
ford has taken charge of the Weiland
and Kessler store at Nordmont.

master, Nelson Zaner Leo Kushinka,
Warden Bahr and Sherman Bahr,
being determined to capture some-
thing before the close of the hunt-
ing season, started out in the di-
