The truth is that in proportion to the wealth of this country the naval expenditures of the present time do not seem grossly extravagant. Some one has figured out that comparing what we have paid out for naval purposes since 1801 with the value of American property gives an average naval tax of .00123 per cent. 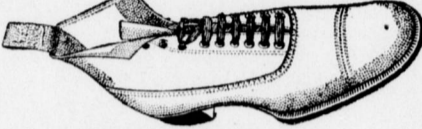

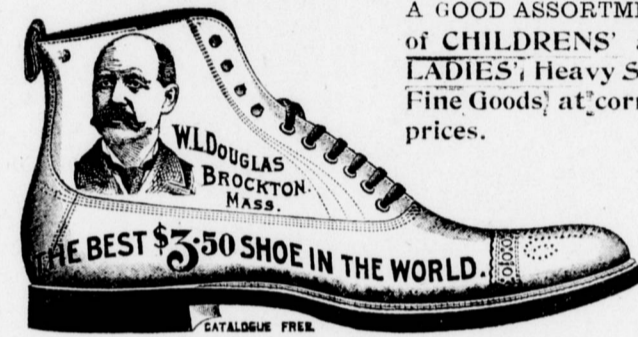
