Nearly all of the foreigners who were employed in the tannery have moved elsewhere to seek employment.

Frank Fagot, an Italian boy who claims to be but sixteen years old, is in the Bradford county jail awaiting the arrival of an officer from this county to bring him to the Laporte jail. He was arrested at Towanda Tuesday charged with assault and attempt to kill. One night last week at Bernice he called George Chapman out back of the store and then struck him over the head with an iron bar, injuring him so seriously that he remained unconscious for five hours. The Italian made his escape and could not be found until Tuesday when he was arrested at Towanda, where he had purchased a ticket to Elmira.

One of the finest compliments we have ever known paid to the great class of people called "farmers" is the plain statement of fact made by the statisticians that although farmers form one-half of the population of our country, yet only two per cent of all crime is committed by them. Criminality is a thing almost unknown among the tillers of the soil. How proud one should be to be called a "good honest farmer" when the term relates not only to occupation but also to standing in society.

Very interesting reading for taxpayers is to be found in the indictments against the Potter County Commissioners. One specification is that of paying \$1700 for bridge that was offered to the Sharon supervisor for \$1200; another is that of knocking off five-sixths of a manufacturing company's assessment, and in another case nine-tenths after appeal day. Among the general charges are conspiracy, letting public contracts for reward, defrauding and neglect of duty. It is gratifying to know that in several counties of that state the taxpaying worms have turned.

One of the most brutal murders that was ever committed occurred in Potter county Wednesday of last week when 21 year old C. Brewster deliberately loaned a gun, walked three miles to where his step father was working and sent the lead into his head. He surrendered himself to the authorities and gave no excuse for his crime other than family troubles.

A serious effort to shorten school hours for the relief of small children will be made by the leading educators throughout the state. It is proposed to reduce the hours of children in the first two years of primary instruction from five to three and a half hours. It is urged that such a reform is no less in the interests of the teachers than of the pupils, and that the effectiveness of the schools would not be lessened.

A glimpse of the country these days will do any man or woman good. Nature is arrayed in her most beautiful apparel during the early spring days and it is one of the pleasures of life to get close to her heart at times.

Agricultural conditions all over the state are in good shape, according to the weekly Climate and Crop Bulletin. Wheat, rye, meadows and pastures have made vigorous growth and some rye is heading. Seeds have germinated well. Nearly all fruits bloomed abundantly and, with a few local exceptions, promise a full average crop.

It is reported that the construction of the Lairdsville trolley line, from Millville to Lairdsville, is being pushed steadily ahead. It will be a through line from Bloomsburg and will go by way of Sonestown to reach Eagles Mere.

That fine old Democratic organ, the Bloomsburg "Columbian", has become thoroughly disgusted with the corruption in its party in Columbia County, where the Democrats are in a majority, though gradually becoming fewer. It declares the party "has reached its present condition through the boodle system and through the perfidy of some of its trusted leaders." This is pretty dismal, but why not call in the Hon. William Trenton Creasy? He is a distinguished citizen of Columbia County who makes a speciality of reform. Encourage him to try his speciiic on his own party in his own county.

### Summer School at Dushore.

The summer school for the teachers of Sullivan County will be held in Dushore High School building, opening Monday, June 26, 1905, and continuing four weeks.

The following instructors have been engaged:—Prof. D. M. Flick, History, Grammar, and Orthography; Prof. T. V. Kelly, Reading, Geography, and Civil Government; Co. Supt. J. E. Reese Killgore, Methods and Theory and Practice of Teaching.

All teachers should patronize this school. It is not conducted for profit the entire receipts from tuition being expended to secure able instructors.

We are endeavoring to secure the adoption of the Illinois Course of Study in every school district in Sullivan County,—the purpose being to secure more efficient work. The mere adoption of this course of study will not secure the desired results unless the teachers of the county become thoroughly familiar with this course of study, and co-operate with the superintendent by attending the summer school the full term. This course of study will be used as a basis of all the work done in the summer school, and feeling that the time is at hand when the people may reasonably require greater professional side of teaching will be emphasized. Progressive teachers will find it to their advantage to attend this school.
