The summer school for the teach-
ers of Sullivan County will be held
in Dushore High School building,
opening Monday, June 26, 1905, and
continuing four weeks.

The following instructors have
been engaged:—Prof. D. M. Flick,
History, Grammar, and Orthograp-
hy; Prof. T. V. Kelly, Reading,
Geography, and Civil Government;
Co. Supt. J. E. Reese Killgore,
Methods and Theory and Practice of
Teaching.

All teachers should patronize this
school. It is not conducted for profit
the entire receipts from tuition being
expended to secure able instructors.

We are endeavoring to secure the
adoption of the Illinois Course of
Study in every school district in Sul-
livan County,—the purpose being to
secure more efficient work. The
mere adoption of this course of study
will not secure the desired results
unless the teachers of the county be-
come thoroughly familiar with this
course of study, and co-operate with
the superintendent by attending the
summer school the full term. This
course of study will be used as a ba-
sis of all the work done in the sum-
mer school, and feeling that the time
is at hand when the people may rea-
sonably require greater professional
side of teaching will be emphasized.
Progressive teachers will find it to
their advantage to attend this school.
