Mrs. Harriet Wagner of Wyalusing, was a guest at the home of Judge Ingham, Monday night, while on her way to Eagles Mere, to visit her sister, Mrs. E. V. Ingham.

Judge Reeser has purchased the interest of Samuel Cole in the Dushore Silk Manufacturing company.

Work has again been resumed on the Binghamton Williamsport rail, road west of Sugar Run, sixty men having started to work Monday morning. East of Wyalusing work has continued right along, notwithstanding the report that the company was to dissolve.

The Rev. Eugene A. Heim is attending the Diocesan Convention which meets at Harrisburg. He will also spend a week with his parents at Lancaster, Pa.

There will be no service in the Episcopal Church next Sunday.

There are a few luckier men in the State than Henry Dahler, a farmer residing three miles northwest of Ridgway. Dahler is enjoying a flowing oil well on his farm that is spouting out amber riches as fast as an inch pipe can emit it. And, best of all, the well didn't cost him a cent.

Pennsylvania oil is now selling at \$1.97 per barrel, and inasmuch as Dahler's gift well is producing about 20 barrels a day he is reaping a profit of about \$25 daily.

The rigid enforcement of the factory inspection law is turning loose hundreds and even thousands of boys and girls who have hitherto been employed in factories or around mines. The compulsory school law will put these youngsters into school when the fall term begins, and will put them in a way to get their just dues - an education, or at least a start toward it.

Mrs. C. G. Meyers died June 10 at the home of her son-in-law, Wm. L. Jennings, at Lopez. The Meyers' have been among the earlier settlers and influential families of Mehoopany. The husband died about a year ago. Mrs. Myers was 61 years of age and has suffered greatly from a tumor which was the cause of her death. She leaves two daughters, Mrs. J. I. Cole of New York City and Mrs. Wm. Jennings of Lopez to mourn her death.

As the summer schedule of the W. & N. B. railroad now goes into effect, the following changes will take place: H. A. Knipe superintendent of the Eagles Mere road, will return to Sonestown, where he has offices for the summer; D. K. Townsend will have charge of the main line and G. M. Case will be freight and passenger agent.

A series of four experiments looking toward eradication of the San Jose scale and other insects, pests and plant diseases in Pennsylvania is about to be undertaken by the State under the law passed by the last Legislature, which appropriate \$30,000 yearly for the work.

Probably the most important experiment is that with San Jose scale in orchards. This is to be conducted in Bedford county by R. F. Lee trained in Bedford county at the Agricultural Department of Pennsylvania State College. Numerous experiments have already been made in Bedford, which affords as good a field as any other in the State. Mr. Lee is a resident of Bedford.

Summer School at Dushore.
The summer school for the teachers of Sullivan County will be held in Dushore High School building, opening Monday, June 26, 1905, and continuing four weeks.

The following instructors have been engaged: - Prof. D. M. Fliet, History, Grammar, and Orthography; Prof. T. V. Kelly, Reading, Geography, and Civil Government; Co. Supt. J. E. Reese Killgore, Methods and Theory and Practice of Teaching.

All teachers should patronize this school. It is not conducted for profit the entire receipts from tuition being expended to secure able instructors.

We are endeavoring to secure the adoption of the Illinois Course of Study in every school district in Sullivan County, - the purpose being to secure more efficient work. The mere adoption of this course of study will not secure the desired results unless the teachers of the county become thoroughly familiar with this course of study, and co-operate with the superintendent by attending the summer school the full term. This course of study will be used as a basis of all the work done in the summer school, and feeling that the time is at hand when the people may reasonably require greater professional side of teaching will be emphasized. Progressive teachers will find it to their advantage to attend this school.

Tuition: Four dollars for full term of four weeks; for less than full term two dollars per week.

Text books will be furnished, but as the supply is limited it is important that all who have books, bring them. Uniformity of text-books is not essential.
