This is more than twice the amount of vacation money apportioned a year ago by the company.

The company wrote to Andrew Carnegie two years ago and asked him the best way to get their employees interested in the business. Mr. Carnegie advised that they be allowed to participate in the earnings. Those sharing the profits include the managers, superintendents, clerks, foremen, chemists, assayers, purchasing agents and others, and the money will go all over this country and Mexico. The amount distributed indicates that the company has earned over \$8,300,000 the past year.
