Blackbirds may now be legally killed in the state of Pennsylvania for the first time since 1878. A protective law was passed at that time which has been in force ever since, until the last legislation enacted its general game bill.

In addition to the blackbird the open season commenced on Friday, September 1, for these:

Railbird, reed bird, dove, sandpiper, tatler, curlew, or any other shore bird; Wilson or Jack snipe, wild goose, wild duck, brant, swan, coot and mud-hen.

The open season will continue until January 1, in all cases except that of the jack snipe; the season for that bird extends until May 1.

The complete protection was removed from blackbirds by the last For a well Kept legislature because the birds are being killed in the south annually in great numbers. In many parts of the country below the line the blackbird is regarded as a pest and is shot


